

THE ACTS OF THE APOSTLES

CHAPTER 1

THE former treatise have I made, O Thē-ōph-ī-lūs, of all that Jē-šūs began both to do and teach,

2 Until the day in which he was taken up, after that he through the Holy Ghost had given commandments unto the apostles whom he had chosen:

3 To whom also he shewed himself alive after his passion by many infallible proofs, being seen of them forty days, and speaking of the things pertaining to the kingdom of God:

4 And, being assembled together with *them*, commanded them that they should not depart from Jē-rû-să-lēm, but wait for the promise of the Father, which, *saith he*, ye have heard of me.

5 For Jōhn truly baptized with water; but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence.

6 When they therefore were come together, they asked of him, saying, Lord, wilt thou at this time restore again the kingdom to ĩs-rā-ēl?

7 And he said unto them, It is not for you to know the times or the seasons, which the Father hath put in his own power.

8 But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jē-rû-să-lēm, and in all Jû-dă-ă, and in Să-mâr-ī-ă, and unto the uttermost part of the earth.

9 And when he had spoken these things, while they beheld, he was taken up; and a cloud received him out of their sight.

10 And while they looked stedfastly toward heaven as he went up, behold, two men stood by them in white apparel;

11 Which also said, Ye men of Găl-ī-lēē, why stand ye gazing up into heaven? this same Jē-šūs, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven.

12 Then returned they unto Jē-rû-să-lēm from the mount called Ōl-ī-vēt, which is from Jē-rû-să-lēm a sabbath day's journey.

13 And when they were come in, they went up into an upper room, where abode both Pē-tēr, and Jāmeš, and Jōhn, and Ān-drēw, Phīl-īp, and Thōm-ās, Băr-thōl-ō-mēw, and Mătth-ēw, Jāmeš *the son of Āl-phă-ūs*, and Sī-mōn Zē-lō-tēs, and Jû-dăs *the brother of Jāmeš*.

14 These all continued with one accord in prayer and supplication, with the women, and Mâr-ŷ the mother of Jē-šūs, and with his brethren.

15 ¶ And in those days Pē-tēr stood up in the midst of the disciples, and said, (the number of names together were about an hundred and twenty,)

16 Men *and* brethren, this scripture must needs have been fulfilled, which the Holy Ghost by the mouth of Dă-vīd spake before concerning Jû-dăs, which was guide to them that took Jē-šūs.

17 For he was numbered with us, and had obtained part of this ministry.

18 Now this man purchased a field with the reward of iniquity; and falling headlong, he burst asunder in the midst, and all his bowels gushed out.

19 And it was known unto all the dwellers at Jē-rû-să-lēm; insomuch as that field is called in their proper tongue, Ā-čēl-dă-mă, that is to say, The field of blood.

20 For it is written in the book of Psalms, Let his habitation be desolate, and let no man dwell therein: and his bishoprick let another take.

21 Wherefore of these men which have companied with us all the time that the Lord Jē-šūs went in and out among us,

22 Beginning from the baptism of Jōhn, unto that same day that he was taken up from us, must one be ordained to be a witness with us of his resurrection.

23 And they appointed two, Jō-šēph called Băr-să-băs, who was surnamed Jūs-tūs, and Mătth-ī-ăs.

24 And they prayed, and said, Thou, Lord, which knowest the hearts of all *men*, shew whether of these two thou hast chosen,

25 That he may take part of this ministry and apostleship, from which Jû-dăs by transgression fell, that he might go to his own place.

26 And they gave forth their lots; and the lot fell upon Mătth-ī-ăs; and he was numbered with the eleven apostles.

CHAPTER 2

AND when the day of Pěn-tē-cōst was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place.

2 And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting.

3 And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them.

4 And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance.

5 And there were dwelling at Jē-rû-să-lēm Jēwś, devout men, out of every nation under heaven.

6 Now when this was noised abroad, the multitude came together, and were confounded, because that every man heard them speak in his own language.

7 And they were all amazed and marvelled, saying one to another, Behold, are not all these which speak Găl-ī-lă-ăs?

8 And how hear we every man in our own tongue, wherein we were born?

9 Păr-thī-ăs, and Mēdeš, and Ē-lām-ītes, and the dwellers in Mēs-ō-pō-tă-mī-ă, and in Jû-dă-ă, and Căp-pă-dō-čī-ă, in Pōn-tūs, and Ā-sīă,

10 Phrŷg-ī-ă, and Păm-phŷl-ī-ă, in Ē-gŷpt, and in the parts of Lib-ŷ-ă about Čŷ-rē-nē, and strangers of Rōme, Jēwś and proselytes,

11 Crētes and Ā-ră-bī-ăs, we do hear them speak in our tongues the wonderful works of God.

12 And they were all amazed, and were in doubt, saying one to another, What meaneth this?

13 Others mocking said, These men are full of new wine.

14 ¶ But Pē'tēr, standing up with the eleven, lifted up his voice, and said unto them, Ye men of Jû-dæ'ă, and all ye that dwell at Jě-rû'să-lēm, be this known unto you, and hearken to my words:

15 For these are not drunken, as ye suppose, seeing it is *but* the third hour of the day.

16 But this is that which was spoken by the prophet Jō'ēl;

17 And it shall come to pass in the last days, saith God, I will pour out of my Spirit upon all flesh: and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams:

18 And on my servants and on my handmaidens I will pour out in those days of my Spirit; and they shall prophesy:

19 And I will shew wonders in heaven above, and signs in the earth beneath; blood, and fire, and vapour of smoke:

20 The sun shall be turned into darkness, and the moon into blood, before that great and notable day of the Lord come:

21 And it shall come to pass, *that* whosoever shall call on the name of the Lord shall be saved.

22 Ye men of Īś-rā-ēl, hear these words; Jē'sūs of Năz'ă-rěth, a man approved of God among you by miracles and wonders and signs, which God did by him in the midst of you, as ye yourselves also know:

23 Him, being delivered by the determinate counsel and foreknowledge of God, ye have taken, and by wicked hands have crucified and slain:

24 Whom God hath raised up, having loosed the pains of death: because it was not possible that he should be holden of it.

25 For Dă'vīd speaketh concerning him, I foresaw the Lord always before my face, for he is on my right hand, that I should not be moved:

26 Therefore did my heart rejoice, and my tongue was glad; moreover also my flesh shall rest in hope:

27 Because thou wilt not leave my soul in hell, neither wilt thou suffer thine Holy One to see corruption.

28 Thou hast made known to me the ways of life; thou shalt make me full of joy with thy countenance.

29 Men *and* brethren, let me freely speak unto you of the patriarch Dă'vīd, that he is both dead and buried, and his sepulchre is with us unto this day.

30 Therefore being a prophet, and knowing that God had sworn with an oath to him, that of the fruit of his loins, according to the flesh, he would raise up Christ to sit on his throne;

31 He seeing this before spake of the resurrection of Christ, that his soul was not left in hell, neither his flesh *did* see corruption.

32 This Jē'sūs hath God raised up, whereof we all are witnesses.

33 Therefore being by the right hand of God exalted, and

having received of the Father the promise of the Holy Ghost, he hath shed forth this, which ye now see and hear.
34 For Dă'vīd is not ascended into the heavens: but he saith himself, The LORD said unto my Lord, Sit thou on my right hand,

35 Until I make thy foes thy footstool.

36 Therefore let all the house of Īś-rā-ēl know assuredly, that God hath made that same Jē'sūs, whom ye have crucified, both Lord and Christ.

37 ¶ Now when they heard *this*, they were pricked in their heart, and said unto Pē'tēr and to the rest of the apostles, Men *and* brethren, what shall we do?

38 Then Pē'tēr said unto them, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jē'sūs Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost.

39 For the promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, *even* as many as the Lord our God shall call.

40 And with many other words did he testify and exhort, saying, Save yourselves from this untoward generation.

41 ¶ Then they that gladly received his word were baptized: and the same day there were added *unto them* about three thousand souls.

42 And they continued stedfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayers.

43 And fear came upon every soul: and many wonders and signs were done by the apostles.

44 And all that believed were together, and had all things common;

45 And sold their possessions and goods, and parted them to all *men*, as every man had need.

46 And they, continuing daily with one accord in the temple, and breaking bread from house to house, did eat their meat with gladness and singleness of heart,

47 Praising God, and having favour with all the people. And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved.

CHAPTER 3

NOW Pē'tēr and Jōhn went up together into the temple at the hour of prayer, *being* the ninth hour.

2 And a certain man lame from his mother's womb was carried, whom they laid daily at the gate of the temple which is called Beautiful, to ask alms of them that entered into the temple;

3 Who seeing Pē'tēr and Jōhn about to go into the temple asked an alms.

4 And Pē'tēr, fastening his eyes upon him with Jōhn, said, Look on us.

5 And he gave heed unto them, expecting to receive something of them.

6 Then Pē'tēr said, Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have give I thee: In the name of Jē'sūs Christ of Năz'ă-rěth rise up and walk.

7 And he took him by the right hand, and lifted *him* up: and immediately his feet and ancle bones received strength.

8 And he leaping up stood, and walked, and entered with them into the temple, walking, and leaping, and praising God.

9 And all the people saw him walking and praising God:

10 And they knew that it was he which sat for alms at the Beautiful gate of the temple: and they were filled with wonder and amazement at that which had happened unto him.

11 And as the lame man which was healed held Pē'tēr and Jōhn, all the people ran together unto them in the porch that is called Sōl'ō-mōn's, greatly wondering.

12 ¶ And when Pē'tēr saw *it*, he answered unto the people, Ye men of Īs'rā-ēl, why marvel ye at this? or why look ye so earnestly on us, as though by our own power or holiness we had made this man to walk?

13 The God of Ā-brā-hām, and of Ī-sāac, and of Jā'qōb, the God of our fathers, hath glorified his Son Jē'sūs; whom ye delivered up, and denied him in the presence of Pī-lāte, when he was determined to let *him* go.

14 But ye denied the Holy One and the Just, and desired a murderer to be granted unto you;

15 And killed the Prince of life, whom God hath raised from the dead; whereof we are witnesses.

16 And his name through faith in his name hath made this man strong, whom ye see and know: yea, the faith which is by him hath given him this perfect soundness in the presence of you all.

17 And now, brethren, I wot that through ignorance ye did *it*, as *did* also your rulers.

18 But those things, which God before had shewed by the mouth of all his prophets, that Chrīst should suffer, he hath so fulfilled.

19 ¶ Repent ye therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out, when the times of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord;

20 And he shall send Jē'sūs Chrīst, which before was preached unto you:

21 Whom the heaven must receive until the times of restitution of all things, which God hath spoken by the mouth of all his holy prophets since the world began.

22 For Mō'sēs truly said unto the fathers, A prophet shall the Lord your God raise up unto you of your brethren, like unto me; him shall ye hear in all things whatsoever he shall say unto you.

23 And it shall come to pass, *that* every soul, which will not hear that prophet, shall be destroyed from among the people.

24 Yea, and all the prophets from Sām'ū-ēl and those that follow after, as many as have spoken, have likewise foretold of these days.

25 Ye are the children of the prophets, and of the covenant which God made with our fathers, saying unto Ā-brā-hām, And in thy seed shall all the kindreds of the earth be blessed.

26 Unto you first God, having raised up his Son Jē'sūs, sent

him to bless you, in turning away every one of you from his iniquities.

CHAPTER 4

AND as they spake unto the people, the priests, and the Captain of the temple, and the Sād-dū-çees, came upon them,

2 Being grieved that they taught the people, and preached through Jē'sūs the resurrection from the dead.

3 And they laid hands on them, and put *them* in hold unto the next day: for it was now eventide.

4 Howbeit many of them which heard the word believed; and the number of the men was about five thousand.

5 ¶ And it came to pass on the morrow, that their rulers, and elders, and scribes,

6 And Ān'nās the high priest, and Cai'ā-phās, and Jōhn, and Āl-ēx-ān-dēr, and as many as were of the kindred of the high priest, were gathered together at Jē-rû-sā-lēm.

7 And when they had set them in the midst, they asked, By what power, or by what name, have ye done this?

8 Then Pē'tēr, filled with the Holy Ghost, said unto them, Ye rulers of the people, and elders of Īs'rā-ēl,

9 If we this day be examined of the good deed done to the impotent man, by what means he is made whole;

10 Be it known unto you all, and to all the people of Īs'rā-ēl, that by the name of Jē'sūs Chrīst of Nāz-ā-rēth, whom ye crucified, whom God raised from the dead, *even* by him doth this man stand here before you whole.

11 This is the stone which was set at nought of you builders, which is become the head of the corner.

12 Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved.

13 ¶ Now when they saw the boldness of Pē'tēr and Jōhn, and perceived that they were unlearned and ignorant men, they marvelled; and they took knowledge of them, that they had been with Jē'sūs.

14 And beholding the man which was healed standing with them, they could say nothing against it.

15 But when they had commanded them to go aside out of the council, they conferred among themselves,

16 Saying, What shall we do to these men? for that indeed a notable miracle hath been done by them *is* manifest to all them that dwell in Jē-rû-sā-lēm; and we cannot deny *it*.

17 But that it spread no further among the people, let us straitly threaten them, that they speak henceforth to no man in this name.

18 And they called them, and commanded them not to speak at all nor teach in the name of Jē'sūs.

19 But Pē'tēr and Jōhn answered and said unto them, Whether it be right in the sight of God to hearken unto you more than unto God, judge ye.

20 For we cannot but speak the things which we have seen and heard.

21 So when they had further threatened them, they let them go, finding nothing how they might punish them,

because of the people: for all *men* glorified God for that which was done.

22 For the man was above forty years old, on whom this miracle of healing was shewed.

23 ¶ And being let go, they went to their own company, and reported all that the chief priests and elders had said unto them.

24 And when they heard that, they lifted up their voice to God with one accord, and said, Lord, thou *art* God, which hast made heaven, and earth, and the sea, and all that in them is:

25 Who by the mouth of thy servant Dā'-vīd hast said, Why did the heathen rage, and the people imagine vain things?

26 The kings of the earth stood up, and the rulers were gathered together against the Lord, and against his Christ.

27 For of a truth against thy holy child Jē'-šūs, whom thou hast anointed, both Hēr'-ōd, and Pōn'-tīūs Pī'lāte, with the Ġēn'-tīlēš, and the people of Īś'-rā-ēl, were gathered together,

28 For to do whatsoever thy hand and thy counsel determined before to be done.

29 And now, Lord, behold their threatenings: and grant unto thy servants, that with all boldness they may speak thy word,

30 By stretching forth thine hand to heal; and that signs and wonders may be done by the name of thy holy child Jē'-šūs.

31 ¶ And when they had prayed, the place was shaken where they were assembled together; and they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and they spake the word of God with boldness.

32 And the multitude of them that believed were of one heart and of one soul: neither said any *of them* that ought of the things which he possessed was his own; but they had all things common.

33 And with great power gave the apostles witness of the resurrection of the Lord Jē'-šūs: and great grace was upon them all.

34 Neither was there any among them that lacked: for as many as were possessors of lands or houses sold them, and brought the prices of the things that were sold,

35 And laid *them* down at the apostles' feet: and distribution was made unto every man according as he had need.

36 And Jō'-šēš, who by the apostles was surnamed Bār'-nā-bās, (which is, being interpreted, The son of consolation,) a Lē'-vīte, and of the country of Ćy'-prūs,

37 Having land, sold *it*, and brought the money, and laid *it* at the apostles' feet.

CHAPTER 5

BUT a certain man named Ān-ā-nī-ās, with Sāpph-ī-rā his wife, sold a possession,

2 And kept back *part* of the price, his wife also being privy to *it*, and brought a certain part, and laid *it* at the apostles' feet.

3 But Pē'-tēr said, Ān-ā-nī-ās, why hath Sā-ťān filled thine heart to lie to the Holy Ghost, and to keep back *part* of the price of the land?

4 Whiles it remained, was it not thine own? and after it was sold, was it not in thine own power? why hast thou conceived this thing in thine heart? thou hast not lied unto men, but unto God.

5 And Ān-ā-nī-ās hearing these words fell down, and gave up the ghost: and great fear came on all them that heard these things.

6 And the young men arose, wound him up, and carried *him* out, and buried *him*.

7 And it was about the space of three hours after, when his wife, not knowing what was done, came in.

8 And Pē'-tēr answered unto her, Tell me whether ye sold the land for so much? And she said, Yea, for so much.

9 Then Pē'-tēr said unto her, How is it that ye have agreed together to tempt the Spirit of the Lord? behold, the feet of them which have buried thy husband *are* at the door, and shall carry thee out.

10 Then fell she down straightway at his feet, and yielded up the ghost: and the young men came in, and found her dead, and, carrying *her* forth, buried *her* by her husband.

11 And great fear came upon all the church, and upon as many as heard these things.

12 ¶ And by the hands of the apostles were many signs and wonders wrought among the people; (and they were all with one accord in Sōl'-ō-mōn's porch.

13 And of the rest durst no man join himself to them: but the people magnified them.

14 And believers were the more added to the Lord, multitudes both of men and women.)

15 Insomuch that they brought forth the sick into the streets, and laid *them* on beds and couches, that at the least the shadow of Pē'-tēr passing by might overshadow some of them.

16 There came also a multitude *out* of the cities round about unto Jē-rû-sā-lēm, bringing sick folks, and them which were vexed with unclean spirits: and they were healed every one.

17 ¶ Then the high priest rose up, and all *they* that were with him, (which is the sect of the Sād'-dū-ċēēs,) and were filled with indignation,

18 And laid their hands on the apostles, and put them in the common prison.

19 But the angel of the Lord by night opened the prison doors, and brought them forth, and said,

20 Go, stand and speak in the temple to the people all the words of this life.

21 And when they heard *that*, they entered into the temple early in the morning, and taught. But the high priest came, and they that were with him, and called the council together, and all the senate of the children of Īś'-rā-ēl, and sent to the prison to have them brought.

22 But when the officers came, and found them not in the

prison, they returned, and told,
 23 Saying, The prison truly found we shut with all safety, and the keepers standing without before the doors: but when we had opened, we found no man within.
 24 Now when the high priest and the captain of the temple and the chief priests heard these things, they doubted of them whereunto this would grow.
 25 Then came one and told them, saying, Behold, the men whom ye put in prison are standing in the temple, and teaching the people.
 26 Then went the captain with the officers, and brought them without violence: for they feared the people, lest they should have been stoned.
 27 And when they had brought them, they set *them* before the council: and the high priest asked them,
 28 Saying, Did not we straitly command you that ye should not teach in this name? and, behold, ye have filled Jē-rû-să-lēm with your doctrine, and intend to bring this man's blood upon us.
 29 ¶ Then Pē-tēr and the *other* apostles answered and said, We ought to obey God rather than men.
 30 The God of our fathers raised up Jē-šūs, whom ye slew and hanged on a tree.
 31 Him hath God exalted with his right hand *to be* a Prince and a Saviour, for to give repentance to ĩś-rā-ěl, and forgiveness of sins.
 32 And we are his witnesses of these things; and *so is* also the Holy Ghost, whom God hath given to them that obey him.
 33 ¶ When they heard *that*, they were cut *to the heart*, and took counsel to slay them.
 34 Then stood there up one in the council, a Phăr-ĩ-sēe, named Gă-mă-lĩ-ěl, a doctor of the law, had in reputation among all the people, and commanded to put the apostles forth a little space;
 35 And said unto them, Ye men of ĩś-rā-ěl, take heed to yourselves what ye intend to do as touching these men.
 36 For before these days rose up Theũ-dăs, boasting himself to be somebody; to whom a number of men, about four hundred, joined themselves: who was slain; and all, as many as obeyed him, were scattered, and brought to nought.
 37 After this man rose up Jũ-dăs of Găl-ĩ-lēe in the days of the taxing, and drew away much people after him: he also perished; and all, *even* as many as obeyed him, were dispersed.
 38 And now I say unto you, Refrain from these men, and let them alone; for if this counsel or this work be of men, it will come to nought:
 39 But if it be of God, ye cannot overthrow it; lest haply ye be found even to fight against God.
 40 And to him they agreed: and when they had called the apostles, and beaten *them*, they commanded that they should not speak in the name of Jē-šūs, and let them go.
 41 ¶ And they departed from the presence of the council,

rejoicing that they were counted worthy to suffer shame for his name.

42 And daily in the temple, and in every house, they ceased not to teach and preach Jē-šūs Christ.

CHAPTER 6

AND in those days, when the number of the disciples was multiplied, there arose a murmuring of the Grē-ċiāns against the Hē-brēwś, because their widows were neglected in the daily ministration.

2 Then the twelve called the multitude of the disciples *unto them*, and said, It is not reason that we should leave the word of God, and serve tables.

3 Wherefore, brethren, look ye out among you seven men of honest report, full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom, whom we may appoint over this business.

4 But we will give ourselves continually to prayer, and to the ministry of the word.

5 ¶ And the saying pleased the whole multitude: and they chose Stē-phēn, a man full of faith and of the Holy Ghost, and Phĩl-ĩp, and Prōch-ō-rūs, and Nĩ-cā-nōr, and Tĩ-mōn, and Pār-mē-nās, and Nĩc-ō-lās a proselyte of Ān-tĩ-ōch:

6 Whom they set before the apostles: and when they had prayed, they laid *their* hands on them.

7 And the word of God increased; and the number of the disciples multiplied in Jē-rû-să-lēm greatly; and a great company of the priests were obedient to the faith.

8 And Stē-phēn, full of faith and power, did great wonders and miracles among the people.

9 ¶ Then there arose certain of the synagogue, which is called *the synagogue* of the Lĩ-bēr-tines, and Çy-rē-nĩ-āns, and Āl-ēx-ān-drĩ-āns, and of them of Çĩ-lĩç-ĩ-ā and of Ā-siā, disputing with Stē-phēn.

10 And they were not able to resist the wisdom and the spirit by which he spake.

11 Then they suborned men, which said, We have heard him speak blasphemous words against Mō-šēs, and *against* God.

12 And they stirred up the people, and the elders, and the scribes, and came upon *him*, and caught him, and brought *him* to the council,

13 And set up false witnesses, which said, This man ceaseth not to speak blasphemous words against this holy place, and the law:

14 For we have heard him say, that this Jē-šūs of Năz-ă-rēth shall destroy this place, and shall change the customs which Mō-šēs delivered us.

15 And all that sat in the council, looking stedfastly on him, saw his face as it had been the face of an angel.

CHAPTER 7

THEN said the high priest, Are these things so?

2 And he said, Men, brethren, and fathers, hearken; The God of glory appeared unto our father Ā-brā-hām, when he was in Mēs-ō-pō-tā-mĩ-ā, before he dwelt in Chăr-rān,
 3 And said unto him, Get thee out of thy countr̃y, and from

thy kindred, and come into the land which I shall shew thee.

4 Then came he out of the land of the Chāl-dā-āns, and dwelt in Chār-rān: and from thence, when his father was dead, he removed him into this land, wherein ye now dwell.

5 And he gave him none inheritance in it, no, not so much as to set his foot on: yet he promised that he would give it to him for a possession, and to his seed after him, when as yet he had no child.

6 And God spake on this wise, That his seed should sojourn in a strange land; and that they should bring them into bondage, and entreat *them* evil four hundred years.

7 And the nation to whom they shall be in bondage will I judge, said God: and after that shall they come forth, and serve me in this place.

8 And he gave him the covenant of circumcision: and so Ā-brā-hām begat Ī-sāac, and circumcised him the eighth day; and Ī-sāac begat Jā-cōb; and Jā-cōb begat the twelve patriarchs.

9 And the patriarchs, moved with envy, sold Jō-šēph into Ē-gŷpt: but God was with him,

10 And delivered him out of all his afflictions, and gave him favour and wisdom in the sight of Phār-āōh king of Ē-gŷpt; and he made him governor over Ē-gŷpt and all his house.

11 Now there came a dearth over all the land of Ē-gŷpt and Chā-nā-ān, and great affliction: and our fathers found no sustenance.

12 But when Jā-cōb heard that there was corn in Ē-gŷpt, he sent out our fathers first.

13 And at the second time Jō-šēph was made known to his brethren; and Jō-šēph's kindred was made known unto Phār-āōh.

14 Then sent Jō-šēph, and called his father Jā-cōb to *him*, and all his kindred, threescore and fifteen souls.

15 So Jā-cōb went down into Ē-gŷpt, and died, he, and our fathers,

16 And were carried over into Sŷ-chēm, and laid in the sepulchre that Ā-brā-hām bought for a sum of money of the sons of Ēm-mōr the father of Sŷ-chēm.

17 But when the time of the promise drew nigh, which God had sworn to Ā-brā-hām, the people grew and multiplied in Ē-gŷpt,

18 Till another king arose, which knew not Jō-šēph.

19 The same dealt subtilly with our kindred, and evil entreated our fathers, so that they cast out their young children, to the end they might not live.

20 In which time Mō-šēs was born, and was exceeding fair, and nourished up in his father's house three months:

21 And when he was cast out, Phār-āōh's daughter took him up, and nourished him for her own son.

22 And Mō-šēs was learned in all the wisdom of the Ē-gŷp-tiāns, and was mighty in words and in deeds.

23 And when he was full forty years old, it came into his heart to visit his brethren the children of Īs-rā-ēl.

24 And seeing one of *them* suffer wrong, he defended *him*,

and avenged him that was oppressed, and smote the Ē-gŷp-tiān:

25 For he supposed his brethren would have understood how that God by his hand would deliver them: but they understood not.

26 And the next day he shewed himself unto them as they strove, and would have set them at one again, saying, Sirs, ye are brethren; why do ye wrong one to another?

27 But he that did his neighbour wrong thrust him away, saying, Who made thee a ruler and a judge over us?

28 Wilt thou kill me, as thou diddest the Ē-gŷp-tiān yesterday?

29 Then fled Mō-šēs at this saying, and was a stranger in the land of Mā-dī-ān, where he begat two sons.

30 And when forty years were expired, there appeared to him in the wilderness of mount Sī-nā an angel of the Lord in a flame of fire in a bush.

31 When Mō-šēs saw *it*, he wondered at the sight: and as he drew near to behold *it*, the voice of the Lord came unto him,

32 Saying, I *am* the God of thy fathers, the God of Ā-brā-hām, and the God of Ī-sāac, and the God of Jā-cōb. Then Mō-šēs trembled, and durst not behold.

33 Then said the Lord to him, Put off thy shoes from thy feet: for the place where thou standest is holy ground.

34 I have seen, I have seen the affliction of my people which is in Ē-gŷpt, and I have heard their groaning, and am come down to deliver them. And now come, I will send thee into Ē-gŷpt.

35 This Mō-šēs whom they refused, saying, Who made thee a ruler and a judge? the same did God send to be a ruler and a deliverer by the hand of the angel which appeared to him in the bush.

36 He brought them out, after that he had shewed wonders and signs in the land of Ē-gŷpt, and in the Red sea, and in the wilderness forty years.

37 ¶ This is that Mō-šēs, which said unto the children of Īs-rā-ēl, A prophet shall the Lord your God raise up unto you of your brethren, like unto me; him shall ye hear.

38 This is he, that was in the church in the wilderness with the angel which spake to him in the mount Sī-nā, and with our fathers: who received the lively oracles to give unto us:

39 To whom our fathers would not obey, but thrust *him* from them, and in their hearts turned back again into Ē-gŷpt,

40 Saying unto Āa-rōn, Make us gods to go before us: for as for this Mō-šēs, which brought us out of the land of Ē-gŷpt, we wot not what is become of him.

41 And they made a calf in those days, and offered sacrifice unto the idol, and rejoiced in the works of their own hands.

42 Then God turned, and gave them up to worship the host of heaven; as it is written in the book of the prophets, O ye house of Īs-rā-ēl, have ye offered to me slain beasts and sacrifices by the space of forty years in the wilderness?

43 Yea, ye took up the tabernacle of Mō-lōch, and the star

of your god Rēm-phăn, figures which ye made to worship them: and I will carry you away beyond Băb-ŷ-lôn.

44 Our fathers had the tabernacle of witness in the wilderness, as he had appointed, speaking unto Mō-šēs, that he should make it according to the fashion that he had seen.

45 Which also our fathers that came after brought in with Jē-šūs into the possession of the Ğēn-tileš, whom God drave out before the face of our fathers, unto the days of Dă-vîd; 46 Who found favour before God, and desired to find a tabernacle for the God of Jă-côb.

47 But Sôl-ô-môn built him an house.

48 Howbeit the most High dwelleth not in temples made with hands; as saith the prophet,

49 Heaven is my throne, and earth is my footstool: what house will ye build me? saith the Lord: or what is the place of my rest?

50 Hath not my hand made all these things?

51 ¶ Ye stiffnecked and uncircumcised in heart and ears, ye do always resist the Holy Ghost: as your fathers *did*, so *do* ye.

52 Which of the prophets have not your fathers persecuted? and they have slain them which shewed before of the coming of the Just One; of whom ye have been now the betrayers and murderers:

53 Who have received the law by the disposition of angels, and have not kept *it*.

54 ¶ When they heard these things, they were cut to the heart, and they gnashed on him with *their* teeth.

55 But he, being full of the Holy Ghost, looked up stedfastly into heaven, and saw the glory of God, and Jē-šūs standing on the right hand of God,

56 And said, Behold, I see the heavens opened, and the Son of man standing on the right hand of God.

57 Then they cried out with a loud voice, and stopped their ears, and ran upon him with one accord,

58 And cast *him* out of the city, and stoned *him*: and the witnesses laid down their clothes at a young man's feet, whose name was Săul.

59 And they stoned Stē-phēn, calling upon *God*, and saying, Lord Jē-šūs, receive my spirit.

60 And he kneeled down, and cried with a loud voice, Lord, lay not this sin to their charge. And when he had said this, he fell asleep.

CHAPTER 8

AND Săul was consenting unto his death. And at that time there was a great persecution against the church which was at Jě-rû-să-lēm; and they were all scattered abroad throughout the regions of Jû-dă-ă and Să-mâr-ŷ-ă, except the apostles.

2 And devout men carried Stē-phēn to *his burial*, and made great lamentation over him.

3 As for Săul, he made havock of the church, entering into every house, and haling men and women committed *them* to prison.

4 Therefore they that were scattered abroad went every where preaching the word.

5 Then Phîl-ŷp went down to the city of Să-mâr-ŷ-ă, and preached *Christ* unto them.

6 And the people with one accord gave heed unto those things which Phîl-ŷp spake, hearing and seeing the miracles which he did.

7 For unclean spirits, crying with loud voice, came out of many that were possessed *with them*: and many taken with palsies, and that were lame, were healed.

8 And there was great joy in that city.

9 But there was a certain man, called Sî-môn, which before-time in the same city used sorcery, and bewitched the people of Să-mâr-ŷ-ă, giving out that himself was some great one:

10 To whom they all gave heed, from the least to the greatest, saying, This man is the great power of God.

11 And to him they had regard, because that of long time he had bewitched them with sorceries.

12 But when they believed Phîl-ŷp preaching the things concerning the kingdom of God, and the name of Jē-šūs *Christ*, they were baptized, both men and women.

13 Then Sî-môn himself believed also: and when he was baptized, he continued with Phîl-ŷp, and wondered, beholding the miracles and signs which were done.

14 Now when the apostles which were at Jě-rû-să-lēm heard that Să-mâr-ŷ-ă had received the word of God, they sent unto them Pē-tēr and Jōhn:

15 Who, when they were come down, prayed for them, that they might receive the Holy Ghost:

16 (For as yet he was fallen upon none of them: only they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jē-šūs.)

17 Then laid they *their* hands on them, and they received the Holy Ghost.

18 And when Sî-môn saw that through laying on of the apostles' hands the Holy Ghost was given, he offered them money,

19 Saying, Give me also this power, that on whomsoever I lay hands, he may receive the Holy Ghost.

20 But Pē-tēr said unto him, Thy money perish with thee, because thou hast thought that the gift of God may be purchased with money.

21 Thou hast neither part nor lot in this matter: for thy heart is not right in the sight of God.

22 Repent therefore of this thy wickedness, and pray God, if perhaps the thought of thine heart may be forgiven thee.

23 For I perceive that thou art in the gall of bitterness, and *in* the bond of iniquity.

24 Then answered Sî-môn, and said, Pray ye to the Lord for me, that none of these things which ye have spoken come upon me.

25 And they, when they had testified and preached the word of the Lord, returned to Jě-rû-să-lēm, and preached the gospel in many villages of the Să-măr-ŷ-tăns.

26 And the angel of the Lord spake unto Phîl-ŷp, saying,

Arise, and go toward the south unto the way that goeth down from Jě-rû-să-lēm unto Gă-ză, which is desert.

27 And he arose and went: and, behold, a man of Ē-thī-ō-pī-ă, an eunuch of great authority under Căn-dă-cē queen of the Ē-thī-ō-pī-ăns, who had the charge of all her treasure, and had come to Jě-rû-să-lēm for to worship,

28 Was returning, and sitting in his chariot read Ē-săi-ăs the prophet.

29 Then the Spirit said unto Phīl-īp, Go near, and join thyself to this chariot.

30 And Phīl-īp ran thither to *him*, and heard him read the prophet Ē-săi-ăs, and said, Understandest thou what thou readeſt?

31 And he said, How can I, except some man should guide me? And he desired Phīl-īp that he would come up and sit with him.

32 The place of the scripture which he read was this, He was led as a sheep to the slaughter; and like a lamb dumb before his shearer, so opened he not his mouth:

33 In his humiliation his judgment was taken away: and who shall declare his generation? for his life is taken from the earth.

34 And the eunuch answered Phīl-īp, and said, I pray thee, of whom speaketh the prophet this? of himself, or of some other man?

35 Then Phīl-īp opened his mouth, and began at the same scripture, and preached unto him Jē-sūs.

36 And as they went on *their* way, they came unto a certain water: and the eunuch said, See, *here is* water; what doth hinder me to be baptized?

37 And Phīl-īp said, If thou believest with all thine heart, thou mayest. And he answered and said, I believe that Jē-sūs Chrīst is the Son of God.

38 And he commanded the chariot to stand still: and they went down both into the water, both Phīl-īp and the eunuch; and he baptized him.

39 And when they were come up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord caught away Phīl-īp, that the eunuch saw him no more: and he went on his way rejoicing.

40 But Phīl-īp was found at Ā-zō-tūs: and passing through he preached in all the cities, till he came to Că-să-rē-ă.

CHAPTER 9

AND Săul, yet breathing out threatenings and slaughter against the disciples of the Lord, went unto the high priest,

2 And desired of him letters to Dă-măs-cūs to the synagogues, that if he found any of this way, whether they were men or women, he might bring them bound unto Jě-rû-să-lēm.

3 And as he journeyed, he came near Dă-măs-cūs: and suddenly there shined round about him a light from heaven:

4 And he fell to the earth, and heard a voice saying unto him, Săul, Săul, why persecutest thou me?

5 And he said, Who art thou, Lord? And the Lord said, I am

Jē-sūs whom thou persecutest: *it is hard for thee to kick against the pricks.*

6 And he trembling and astonished said, Lord, what wilt thou have me to do? And the Lord said unto him, Arise, and go into the city, and it shall be told thee what thou must do.

7 And the men which journeyed with him stood speechless, hearing a voice, but seeing no man.

8 And Săul arose from the earth; and when his eyes were opened, he saw no man: but they led him by the hand, and brought *him* into Dă-măs-cūs.

9 And he was three days without sight, and neither did eat nor drink.

10 ¶ And there was a certain disciple at Dă-măs-cūs, named Ān-ă-nī-ăs; and to him said the Lord in a vision, Ān-ă-nī-ăs. And he said, Behold, I *am here*, Lord.

11 And the Lord said unto him, Arise, and go into the street which is called Straight, and inquire in the house of Jû-dăs for *one* called Săul, of Tăr-sūs: for, behold, he prayeth,

12 And hath seen in a vision a man named Ān-ă-nī-ăs coming in, and putting *his* hand on him, that he might receive his sight.

13 Then Ān-ă-nī-ăs answered, Lord, I have heard by many of this man, how much evil he hath done to thy saints at Jě-rû-să-lēm:

14 And here he hath authority from the chief priests to bind all that call on thy name.

15 But the Lord said unto him, Go thy way: for he is a chosen vessel unto me, to bear my name before the Ġăn-tileş, and kings, and the children of Īş-ră-ěl:

16 For I will shew him how great things he must suffer for my name's sake.

17 And Ān-ă-nī-ăs went his way, and entered into the house; and putting his hands on him said, Brother Săul, the Lord, *even* Jē-sūs, that appeared unto thee in the way as thou cameſt, hath sent me, that thou mightest receive thy sight, and be filled with the Holy Ghost.

18 And immediately there fell from his eyes as it had been scales: and he received sight forthwith, and arose, and was baptized.

19 And when he had received meat, he was strengthened. Then was Săul certain days with the disciples which were at Dă-măs-cūs.

20 And straightway he preached Chrīst in the synagogues, that he is the Son of God.

21 But all that heard *him* were amazed, and said; Is not this he that destroyed them which called on this name in Jě-rû-să-lēm, and came hither for that intent, that he might bring them bound unto the chief priests?

22 But Săul increased the more in strength, and confounded the Jēws which dwelt at Dă-măs-cūs, proving that this is very Chrīst.

23 ¶ And after that many days were fulfilled, the Jēws took counsel to kill him:

24 But their laying await was known of Săul. And they watched the gates day and night to kill him.

25 Then the disciples took him by night, and let *him* down by the wall in a basket.

26 And when Săul was come to Jē-rû-să-lēm, he assayed to join himself to the disciples: but they were all afraid of him, and believed not that he was a disciple.

27 But Băr-nă-bās took him, and brought *him* to the apostles, and declared unto them how he had seen the Lord in the way, and that he had spoken to him, and how he had preached boldly at Dă-măs-cūs in the name of Jē-šūs.

28 And he was with them coming in and going out at Jē-rû-să-lēm.

29 And he spake boldly in the name of the Lord Jē-šūs, and disputed against the Grē-cīāns: but they went about to slay him.

30 Which when the brethren knew, they brought him down to Că-să-rē-ă, and sent him forth to Tăr-sūs.

31 Then had the churches rest throughout all Jû-dă-ă and Găl-ŷ-lēe and Să-mâr-ŷ-ă, and were edified; and walking in the fear of the Lord, and in the comfort of the Holy Ghost, were multiplied.

32 ¶ And it came to pass, as Pē-tēr passed throughout all *quarters*, he came down also to the saints which dwelt at Lŷd-dă.

33 And there he found a certain man named Ā-nē-ăs, which had kept his bed eight years, and was sick of the palsy.

34 And Pē-tēr said unto him, Ā-nē-ăs, Jē-šūs Chrīst maketh thee whole: arise, and make thy bed. And he arose immediately.

35 And all that dwelt at Lŷd-dă and Sâr-ōn saw him, and turned to the Lord.

36 ¶ Now there was at Jōp-pă a certain disciple named Tăb-ŷ-thă, which by interpretation is called Dôr-căs: this woman was full of good works and almsdeeds which she did.

37 And it came to pass in those days, that she was sick, and died: whom when they had washed, they laid *her* in an upper chamber.

38 And forasmuch as Lŷd-dă was nigh to Jōp-pă, and the disciples had heard that Pē-tēr was there, they sent unto him two men, desiring *him* that he would not delay to come to them.

39 Then Pē-tēr arose and went with them. When he was come, they brought him into the upper chamber: and all the widows stood by him weeping, and shewing the coats and garments which Dôr-căs made, while she was with them.

40 But Pē-tēr put them all forth, and kneeled down, and prayed; and turning *him* to the body said, Tăb-ŷ-thă, arise. And she opened her eyes: and when she saw Pē-tēr, she sat up.

41 And he gave her *his* hand, and lifted her up, and when he had called the saints and widows, presented her alive.

42 And it was known throughout all Jōp-pă; and many believed in the Lord.

43 And it came to pass, that he tarried many days in Jōp-pă with one Sī-mōn a tanner.

CHAPTER 10

THERE was a certain man in Că-să-rē-ă called Cōr-nē-lī-ūs, a centurion of the band called the Ī-tăl-ŷăn band,

2 A devout *man*, and one that feared God with all his house, which gave much alms to the people, and prayed to God always.

3 He saw in a vision evidently about the ninth hour of the day an angel of God coming in to him, and saying unto him, Cōr-nē-lī-ūs.

4 And when he looked on him, he was afraid, and said, What is it, Lord? And he said unto him, Thy prayers and thine alms are come up for a memorial before God.

5 And now send men to Jōp-pă, and call for one Sī-mōn, whose surname is Pē-tēr:

6 He lodgeth with one Sī-mōn a tanner, whose house is by the sea side: he shall tell thee what thou oughtest to do.

7 And when the angel which spake unto Cōr-nē-lī-ūs was departed, he called two of his household servants, and a devout soldier of them that waited on him continually;

8 And when he had declared all *these* things unto them, he sent them to Jōp-pă.

9 ¶ On the morrow, as they went on their journey, and drew nigh unto the city, Pē-tēr went up upon the housetop to pray about the sixth hour:

10 And he became very hungry, and would have eaten: but while they made ready, he fell into a trance,

11 And saw heaven opened, and a certain vessel descending unto him, as it had been a great sheet knit at the four corners, and let down to the earth:

12 Wherein were all manner of fourfooted beasts of the earth, and wild beasts, and creeping things, and fowls of the air.

13 And there came a voice to him, Rise, Pē-tēr; kill, and eat.

14 But Pē-tēr said, Not so, Lord; for I have never eaten any thing that is common or unclean.

15 And the voice *spake* unto him again the second time, What God hath cleansed, *that* call not thou common.

16 This was done thrice: and the vessel was received up again into heaven.

17 Now while Pē-tēr doubted in himself what this vision which he had seen should mean, behold, the men which were sent from Cōr-nē-lī-ūs had made inquiry for Sī-mōn's house, and stood before the gate,

18 And called, and asked whether Sī-mōn, which was surnamed Pē-tēr, were lodged there.

19 ¶ While Pē-tēr thought on the vision, the Spirit said unto him, Behold, three men seek thee.

20 Arise therefore, and get thee down, and go with them, doubting nothing: for I have sent them.

21 Then Pē-tēr went down to the men which were sent unto him from Cōr-nē-lī-ūs; and said, Behold, I am he whom ye seek: what is the cause wherefore ye are come?

22 And they said, Cōr-nē-lī-ūs the centurion, a just man, and one that feareth God, and of good report among all the nation of the Jēw's, was warned from God by an holy angel to send for thee into his house, and to hear words of thee.

23 Then called he them in, and lodged *them*. And on the morrow Pē-tēr went away with them, and certain brethren from Jōp-pā accompanied him.

24 And the morrow after they entered into Cā-šā-rē-ā. And Cōr-nē-lī-ūs waited for them, and had called together his kinsmen and near friends.

25 And as Pē-tēr was coming in, Cōr-nē-lī-ūs met him, and fell down at his feet, and worshipped *him*.

26 But Pē-tēr took him up, saying, Stand up; I myself also am a man.

27 And as he talked with him, he went in, and found many that were come together.

28 And he said unto them, Ye know how that it is an unlawful thing for a man that is a Jēw to keep company, or come unto one of another nation; but God hath shewed me that I should not call any man common or unclean.

29 Therefore came I *unto you* without gainsaying, as soon as I was sent for: I ask therefore for what intent ye have sent for me?

30 And Cōr-nē-lī-ūs said, Four days ago I was fasting until this hour; and at the ninth hour I prayed in my house, and, behold, a man stood before me in bright clothing,

31 And said, Cōr-nē-lī-ūs, thy prayer is heard, and thine alms are had in remembrance in the sight of God.

32 Send therefore to Jōp-pā, and call hither Sī-mōn, whose surname is Pē-tēr; he is lodged in the house of *one* Sī-mōn a tanner by the sea side: who, when he cometh, shall speak unto thee.

33 Immediately therefore I sent to thee; and thou hast well done that thou art come. Now therefore are we all here present before God, to hear all things that are commanded thee of God.

34 ¶ Then Pē-tēr opened *his* mouth, and said, Of a truth I perceive that God is no respecter of persons:

35 But in every nation he that feareth him, and worketh righteousness, is accepted with him.

36 The word which God sent unto the children of Īś-rā-ēl, preaching peace by Jē-šūs Chrīst: (he is Lord of all:)

37 That word, *I say*, ye know, which was published throughout all Jû-dē-ā, and began from Gāl-ī-lēe, after the baptism which Jōhn preached;

38 How God anointed Jē-šūs of Nāz-ā-rēth with the Holy Ghost and with power: who went about doing good, and healing all that were oppressed of the devil; for God was with him.

39 And we are witnesses of all things which he did both in the land of the Jēw's, and in Jē-rû-sā-lēm; whom they slew and hanged on a tree:

40 Him God raised up the third day, and shewed him openly;

41 Not to all the people, but unto witnesses chosen before

of God, *even* to us, who did eat and drink with him after he rose from the dead.

42 And he commanded us to preach unto the people, and to testify that it is he which was ordained of God *to be* the Judge of quick and dead.

43 To him give all the prophets witness, that through his name whosoever believeth in him shall receive remission of sins.

44 ¶ While Pē-tēr yet spake these words, the Holy Ghost fell on all them which heard the word.

45 And they of the circumcision which believed were astonished, as many as came with Pē-tēr, because that on the Ġēn-tiles also was poured out the gift of the Holy Ghost.

46 For they heard them speak with tongues, and magnify God. Then answered Pē-tēr,

47 Can any man forbid water, that these should not be baptized, which have received the Holy Ghost as well as we?

48 And he commanded them to be baptized in the name of the Lord. Then prayed they him to tarry certain days.

CHAPTER 11

AND the apostles and brethren that were in Jû-dē-ā heard that the Ġēn-tiles had also received the word of God.

2 And when Pē-tēr was come up to Jē-rû-sā-lēm, they that were of the circumcision contended with him,

3 Saying, Thou wentest in to men uncircumcised, and didst eat with them.

4 But Pē-tēr rehearsed *the matter* from the beginning, and expounded *it* by order unto them, saying,

5 I was in the city of Jōp-pā praying: and in a trance I saw a vision, A certain vessel descend, as it had been a great sheet, let down from heaven by four corners; and it came even to me:

6 Upon the which when I had fastened mine eyes, I considered, and saw fourfooted beasts of the earth, and wild beasts, and creeping things, and fowls of the air.

7 And I heard a voice saying unto me, Arise, Pē-tēr; slay and eat.

8 But I said, Not so, Lord: for nothing common or unclean hath at any time entered into my mouth.

9 But the voice answered me again from heaven, What God hath cleansed, *that* call not thou common.

10 And this was done three times: and all were drawn up again into heaven.

11 And, behold, immediately there were three men already come unto the house where I was, sent from Cā-šā-rē-ā unto me.

12 And the spirit bade me go with them, nothing doubting. Moreover these six brethren accompanied me, and we entered into the man's house:

13 And he shewed us how he had seen an angel in his house, which stood and said unto him, Send men to Jōp-pā, and call for Sī-mōn, whose surname is Pē-tēr;

14 Who shall tell thee words, whereby thou and all thy

house shall be saved.

15 And as I began to speak, the Holy Ghost fell on them, as on us at the beginning.

16 Then remembered I the word of the Lord, how that he said, Jōhn indeed baptized with water; but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost.

17 Forasmuch then as God gave them the like gift as *he did* unto us, who believed on the Lord Jē'sūs Chrīst; what was I, that I could withstand God?

18 When they heard these things, they held their peace, and glorified God, saying, Then hath God also to the Ġēn'tileš granted repentance unto life.

19 ¶ Now they which were scattered abroad upon the persecution that arose about Stē-phēn travelled as far as Phē-nī-ċē, and Ċy-prūs, and Ān-tī-ōch, preaching the word to none but unto the Jēwš only.

20 And some of them were men of Ċy-prūs and Ċy-rē-nē, which, when they were come to Ān-tī-ōch, spake unto the Grē-ċiāns, preaching the Lord Jē'sūs.

21 And the hand of the Lord was with them: and a great number believed, and turned unto the Lord.

22 ¶ Then tidings of these things came unto the ears of the church which was in Jē-rū-sā-lēm: and they sent forth Bār-nā-bās, that he should go as far as Ān-tī-ōch.

23 Who, when he came, and had seen the grace of God, was glad, and exhorted them all, that with purpose of heart they would cleave unto the Lord.

24 For he was a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost and of faith: and much people was added unto the Lord.

25 Then departed Bār-nā-bās to Tār-sūs, for to seek Sāul:

26 And when he had found him, he brought him unto Ān-tī-ōch. And it came to pass, that a whole year they assembled themselves with the church, and taught much people. And the disciples were called Chrīs-tiāns first in Ān-tī-ōch.

27 ¶ And in these days came prophets from Jē-rū-sā-lēm unto Ān-tī-ōch.

28 And there stood up one of them named Āg-ā-būs, and signified by the spirit that there should be great dearth throughout all the world: which came to pass in the days of Clāu-dī-ūs Ċæ'sār.

29 Then the disciples, every man according to his ability, determined to send relief unto the brethren which dwelt in Jû-dæ-ā:

30 Which also they did, and sent it to the elders by the hands of Bār-nā-bās and Sāul.

CHAPTER 12

Now about that time Hēr-ōd the king stretched forth *his* hands to vex certain of the church.

2 And he killed Jāmeš the brother of Jōhn with the sword.

3 And because he saw it pleased the Jēwš, he proceeded further to take Pē-tēr also. (Then were the days of unleavened bread.)

4 And when he had apprehended him, he put *him* in prison, and delivered *him* to four quaternions of soldiers to keep

him; intending after Easter to bring him forth to the people.

5 Pē-tēr therefore was kept in prison: but prayer was made without ceasing of the church unto God for him.

6 And when Hēr-ōd would have brought him forth, the same night Pē-tēr was sleeping between two soldiers, bound with two chains: and the keepers before the door kept the prison.

7 And, behold, the angel of the Lord came upon *him*, and a light shined in the prison: and he smote Pē-tēr on the side, and raised him up, saying, Arise up quickly. And his chains fell off from *his* hands.

8 And the angel said unto him, Gird thyself, and bind on thy sandals. And so he did. And he saith unto him, Cast thy garment about thee, and follow me.

9 And he went out, and followed him; and wist not that it was true which was done by the angel; but thought he saw a vision.

10 When they were past the first and the second ward, they came unto the iron gate that leadeth unto the city; which opened to them of his own accord: and they went out, and passed on through one street; and forthwith the angel departed from him.

11 And when Pē-tēr was come to himself, he said, Now I know of a surety, that the Lord hath sent his angel, and hath delivered me out of the hand of Hēr-ōd, and *from* all the expectation of the people of the Jēwš.

12 And when he had considered *the thing*, he came to the house of Mār-ŷ the mother of Jōhn, whose surname was Mārķ; where many were gathered together praying.

13 And as Pē-tēr knocked at the door of the gate, a damsel came to hearken, named Rhō-dā.

14 And when she knew Pē-tēr's voice, she opened not the gate for gladness, but ran in, and told how Pē-tēr stood before the gate.

15 And they said unto her, Thou art mad. But she constantly affirmed that it was even so. Then said they, It is his angel.

16 But Pē-tēr continued knocking: and when they had opened *the door*, and saw him, they were astonished.

17 But he, beckoning unto them with the hand to hold their peace, declared unto them how the Lord had brought him out of the prison. And he said, Go shew these things unto Jāmeš, and to the brethren. And he departed, and went into another place.

18 Now as soon as it was day, there was no small stir among the soldiers, what was become of Pē-tēr.

19 And when Hēr-ōd had sought for him, and found him not, he examined the keepers, and commanded that *they* should be put to death. And he went down from Jû-dæ-ā to Cæ-sā-rē-ā, and *there* abode.

20 ¶ And Hēr-ōd was highly displeased with them of Tŷre and Šī-dōn: but they came with one accord to him, and, having made Blās-tūs the king's chamberlain their friend, desired peace; because their country was nourished by the

king's country.

21 And upon a set day Hēr'od, arrayed in royal apparel, sat upon his throne, and made an oration unto them.

22 And the people gave a shout, saying, *It is the voice of a god, and not of a man.*

23 And immediately the angel of the Lord smote him, because he gave not God the glory: and he was eaten of worms, and gave up the ghost.

24 ¶ But the word of God grew and multiplied.

25 And Bār'nā-bās and Saul returned from Jě-rû-să-lēm, when they had fulfilled *their* ministry, and took with them Jōhn, whose surname was Mārķ.

CHAPTER 13

NOW there were in the church that was at Ān'tī-ōch certain prophets and teachers; as Bār'nā-bās, and Sīm'ē-on that was called Nī-gēr, and Lû-ċi-ūs of Ćy-rē-nē, and Mān'ā-ēn, which had been brought up with Hēr'od the tē-trārch, and Saul.

2 As they mīnistered to the Lord, and fasted, the Holy Ghost said, Separate me Bār'nā-bās and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them.

3 And when they had fasted and prayed, and laid *their* hands on them, they sent *them* away.

4 ¶ So they, being sent forth by the Holy Ghost, departed unto Sē-leu-ċi-ā; and from thence they sailed to Ćy-prūs.

5 And when they were at Sāl'ā-mīs, they preached the word of God in the synagogues of the Jēw's: and they had also Jōhn to *their* minister.

6 And when they had gone through the isle unto Pā-phōs, they found a certain sorcerer, a false prophet, a Jēw, whose name was Bār-jē-šūs:

7 Which was with the deputy of the country, Sēr-gi-ūs Pau-lūs, a prudent man; who called for Bār'nā-bās and Saul, and desired to hear the word of God.

8 But Ēl'ŷ-mās the sorcerer (for so is his name by interpretation) withstood them, seeking to turn away the deputy from the faith.

9 Then Saul, (who also is called Paul,) filled with the Holy Ghost, set his eyes on him,

10 And said, O full of all subtilty and all mischief, *thou* child of the devil, *thou* enemy of all righteousness, wilt thou not cease to pervert the right ways of the Lord?

11 And now, behold, the hand of the Lord is upon thee, and thou shalt be blind, not seeing the sun for a season. And immediately there fell on him a mist and a darkness; and he went about seeking some to lead him by the hand.

12 Then the deputy, when he saw what was done, believed, being astonished at the doctrine of the Lord.

13 Now when Paul and his company loosed from Pā-phōs, they came to Pēr-gā in Pām-phyl'ā: and Jōhn departing from them returned to Jě-rû-să-lēm.

14 ¶ But when they departed from Pēr-gā, they came to Ān'tī-ōch in Pī-sid'ā, and went into the synagogue on the sabbath day, and sat down.

15 And after the reading of the law and the prophets the

rulers of the synagogue sent unto them, saying, *Ye men and brethren, if ye have any word of exhortation for the people, say on.*

16 Then Paul stood up, and beckoning with *his* hand said, Men of Īs-rā-ēl, and ye that fear God, give audience.

17 The God of this people of Īs-rā-ēl chose our fathers, and exalted the people when they dwelt as strangers in the land of Ē-gŷpt, and with an high arm brought he them out of it.

18 And about the time of forty years suffered he their manners in the wilderness.

19 And when he had destroyed seven nations in the land of Chā-nā-ān, he divided their land to them by lot.

20 And after that he gave unto *them* judges about the space of four hundred and fifty years, until Sām-ū-ēl the prophet.

21 And afterward they desired a king: and God gave unto them Saul the son of Ćis, a man of the tribe of Bēn-jā-mīn, by the space of forty years.

22 And when he had removed him, he raised up unto them Dā-vīd to be their king; to whom also he gave testimony, and said, I have found Dā-vīd the son of Jēs-sē, a man after mine own heart, which shall fulfil all my will.

23 Of this man's seed hath God according to *his* promise raised unto Īs-rā-ēl a Saviour, Jē-šūs:

24 When Jōhn had first preached before his coming the baptism of repentance to all the people of Īs-rā-ēl.

25 And as Jōhn fulfilled his course, he said, Whom think ye that I am? I am not *he*. But, behold, there cometh one after me, whose shoes of *his* feet I am not worthy to loose.

26 Men and brethren, children of the stock of Ā-brā-hām, and whosoever among you feareth God, to you is the word of this salvation sent.

27 For they that dwell at Jě-rû-să-lēm, and their rulers, because they knew him not, nor yet the voices of the prophets which are read every sabbath day, they have fulfilled *them* in condemning *him*.

28 And though they found no cause of death in *him*, yet desired they Pī-lāte that he should be slain.

29 And when they had fulfilled all that was written of him, they took *him* down from the tree, and laid *him* in a sepulchre.

30 But God raised him from the dead:

31 And he was seen many days of them which came up with him from Gāl'ī-lēe to Jě-rû-să-lēm, who are his witnesses unto the people.

32 And we declare unto you glad tidings, how that the promise which was made unto the fathers,

33 God hath fulfilled the same unto us their children, in that he hath raised up Jē-šūs again; as it is also written in the second psalm, Thou art my Son, this day have I begotten thee.

34 And as concerning that he raised him up from the dead, now no more to return to corruption, he said on this wise, I will give you the sure mercies of Dā-vīd.

35 Wherefore he saith also in another *psalm*, Thou shalt not

suffer thine Holy One to see corruption.

36 For Dā-vīd, after he had served his own generation by the will of God, fell on sleep, and was laid unto his fathers, and saw corruption:

37 But he, whom God raised again, saw no corruption.

38 ¶ Be it known unto you therefore, men *and* brethren, that through this man is preached unto you the forgiveness of sins:

39 And by him all that believe are justified from all things, from which ye could not be justified by the law of Mō-šēš.

40 Beware therefore, lest that come upon you, which is spoken of in the prophets;

41 Behold, ye despisers, and wonder, and perish: for I work a work in your days, a work which ye shall in no wise believe, though a man declare it unto you.

42 And when the Jēwś were gone out of the synagogue, the Ġēn-tileś besought that these words might be preached to them the next sabbath.

43 Now when the congregation was broken up, many of the Jēwś and religious proselytes followed Pāul and Bār-nā-bās: who, speaking to them, persuaded them to continue in the grace of God.

44 ¶ And the next sabbath day came almost the whole city together to hear the word of God.

45 But when the Jēwś saw the multitudes, they were filled with envy, and spake against those things which were spoken by Pāul, contradicting and blaspheming.

46 Then Pāul and Bār-nā-bās waxed bold, and said, It was necessary that the word of God should first have been spoken to you: but seeing ye put it from you, and judge yourselves unworthy of everlasting life, lo, we turn to the Ġēn-tileś.

47 For so hath the Lord commanded us, *saying*, I have set thee to be a light of the Ġēn-tileś, that thou shouldest be for salvation unto the ends of the earth.

48 And when the Ġēn-tileś heard this, they were glad, and glorified the word of the Lord: and as many as were ordained to eternal life believed.

49 And the word of the Lord was published throughout all the region.

50 But the Jēwś stirred up the devout and honourable women, and the chief men of the city, and raised persecution against Pāul and Bār-nā-bās, and expelled them out of their coasts.

51 But they shook off the dust of their feet against them, and came unto Ī-cō-nī-ūm.

52 And the disciples were filled with joy, and with the Holy Ghost.

CHAPTER 14

AND it came to pass in Ī-cō-nī-ūm, that they went both together into the synagogue of the Jēwś, and so spake, that a great multitude both of the Jēwś and also of the Greeks believed.

2 But the unbelieving Jēwś stirred up the Ġēn-tileś, and made their minds evil affected against the brethren.

3 Long time therefore abode they speaking boldly in the Lord, which gave testimony unto the word of his grace, and granted signs and wonders to be done by their hands.

4 But the multitude of the city was divided: and part held with the Jēwś, and part with the apostles.

5 And when there was an assault made both of the Ġēn-tileś, and also of the Jēwś with their rulers, to use *them* despitefully, and to stone them,

6 They were ware of *it*, and fled unto Lys-trā and Dēr-bē, cities of Lȳ-cā-ō-nī-ā, and unto the region that lieth round about:

7 And there they preached the gospel.

8 ¶ And there sat a certain man at Lys-trā, impotent in his feet, being a cripple from his mother's womb, who never had walked:

9 The same heard Pāul speak: who stedfastly beholding him, and perceiving that he had faith to be healed,

10 Said with a loud voice, Stand upright on thy feet. And he leaped and walked.

11 And when the people saw what Pāul had done, they lifted up their voices, saying in the speech of Lȳ-cā-ō-nī-ā, The gods are come down to us in the likeness of men.

12 And they called Bār-nā-bās, Jû-pī-tēr; and Pāul, Mēr-cū-rī-ūs, because he was the chief speaker.

13 Then the priest of Jû-pī-tēr, which was before their city, brought oxen and garlands unto the gates, and would have done sacrifice with the people.

14 *Which* when the apostles, Bār-nā-bās and Pāul, heard of, they rent their clothes, and ran in among the people, crying out,

15 And saying, Sirs, why do ye these things? We also are men of like passions with you, and preach unto you that ye should turn from these vanities unto the living God, which made heaven, and earth, and the sea, and all things that are therein:

16 Who in times past suffered all nations to walk in their own ways.

17 Nevertheless he left not himself without witness, in that he did good, and gave us rain from heaven, and fruitful seasons, filling our hearts with food and gladness.

18 And with these sayings scarce restrained they the people, that they had not done sacrifice unto them.

19 ¶ And there came thither *certain* Jēwś from Ān-tī-ōch and Ī-cō-nī-ūm, who persuaded the people, and, having stoned Pāul, drew *him* out of the city, supposing he had been dead.

20 Howbeit, as the disciples stood round about him, he rose up, and came into the city: and the next day he departed with Bār-nā-bās to Dēr-bē.

21 And when they had preached the gospel to that city, and had taught many, they returned again to Lys-trā, and to Ī-cō-nī-ūm, and Ān-tī-ōch,

22 Confirming the souls of the disciples, *and* exhorting them to continue in the faith, and that we must through much tribulation enter into the kingdom of God.

23 And when they had ordained them elders in every church, and had prayed with fasting, they commended them to the Lord, on whom they believed.

24 And after they had passed throughout Pī-sīd-ī-ă, they came to Pām-phŷl-ī-ă.

25 And when they had preached the word in Pēr-gă, they went down into Āt-tā-lī-ă:

26 And thence sailed to Ān-tī-ōch, from whence they had been recommended to the grace of God for the work which they fulfilled.

27 And when they were come, and had gathered the church together, they rehearsed all that God had done with them, and how he had opened the door of faith unto the Ġēn-tīleš.

28 And there they abode long time with the disciples.

CHAPTER 15

AND certain men which came down from Jû-dă-ă taught the brethren, and said, Except ye be circumcised after the manner of Mō-šēš, ye cannot be saved.

2 When therefore Pāul and Bār-nă-băs had no small dissension and disputation with them, they determined that Pāul and Bār-nă-băs, and certain other of them, should go up to Jě-rû-să-lēm unto the apostles and elders about this question.

3 And being brought on their way by the church, they passed through Phē-nī-ċē and Să-mâr-ī-ă, declaring the conversion of the Ġēn-tīleš: and they caused great joy unto all the brethren.

4 And when they were come to Jě-rû-să-lēm, they were received of the church, and of the apostles and elders, and they declared all things that God had done with them.

5 But there rose up certain of the sect of the Phăr-ī-seēs which believed, saying, That it was needful to circumcise them, and to command them to keep the law of Mō-šēš.

6 ¶ And the apostles and elders came together for to consider of this matter.

7 And when there had been much disputing, Pē-tēr rose up, and said unto them, Men and brethren, ye know how that a good while ago God made choice among us, that the Ġēn-tīleš by my mouth should hear the word of the gospel, and believe.

8 And God, which knoweth the hearts, bare them witness, giving them the Holy Ghost, even as he did unto us;

9 And put no difference between us and them, purifying their hearts by faith.

10 Now therefore why tempt ye God, to put a yoke upon the neck of the disciples, which neither our fathers nor we were able to bear?

11 But we believe that through the grace of the Lord Jē-sūs Christ we shall be saved, even as they.

12 ¶ Then all the multitude kept silence, and gave audience to Bār-nă-băs and Pāul, declaring what miracles and wonders God had wrought among the Ġēn-tīleš by them.

13 ¶ And after they had held their peace, Jāmeš answered,

saying, Men and brethren, hearken unto me:

14 Sīm-ē-ōn hath declared how God at the first did visit the Ġēn-tīleš, to take out of them a people for his name.

15 And to this agree the words of the prophets; as it is written,

16 After this I will return, and will build again the tabernacle of Dă-vīd, which is fallen down; and I will build again the ruins thereof, and I will set it up:

17 That the residue of men might seek after the Lord, and all the Ġēn-tīleš, upon whom my name is called, saith the Lord, who doeth all these things.

18 Known unto God are all his works from the beginning of the world.

19 Wherefore my sentence is, that we trouble not them, which from among the Ġēn-tīleš are turned to God:

20 But that we write unto them, that they abstain from pollutions of idols, and from fornication, and from things strangled, and from blood.

21 For Mō-šēš of old time hath in every city them that preach him, being read in the synagogues every sabbath day.

22 Then pleased it the apostles and elders, with the whole church, to send chosen men of their own company to Ān-tī-ōch with Pāul and Bār-nă-băs; namely, Jû-dăs surnamed Băr-să-băs, and Sī-lăs, chief men among the brethren:

23 And they wrote letters by them after this manner; The apostles and elders and brethren send greeting unto the brethren which are of the Ġēn-tīleš in Ān-tī-ōch and Sŷr-ī-ă and Ćī-liċ-ī-ă:

24 Forasmuch as we have heard, that certain which went out from us have troubled you with words, subverting your souls, saying, Ye must be circumcised, and keep the law: to whom we gave no such commandment:

25 It seemed good unto us, being assembled with one accord, to send chosen men unto you with our beloved Bār-nă-băs and Pāul,

26 Men that have hazarded their lives for the name of our Lord Jē-sūs Christ.

27 We have sent therefore Jû-dăs and Sī-lăs, who shall also tell you the same things by mouth.

28 For it seemed good to the Holy Ghost, and to us, to lay upon you no greater burden than these necessary things;

29 That ye abstain from meats offered to idols, and from blood, and from things strangled, and from fornication: from which if ye keep yourselves, ye shall do well. Fare ye well.

30 So when they were dismissed, they came to Ān-tī-ōch: and when they had gathered the multitude together, they delivered the epistle:

31 Which when they had read, they rejoiced for the consolation.

32 And Jû-dăs and Sī-lăs, being prophets also themselves, exhorted the brethren with many words, and confirmed them.

33 And after they had tarried *there* a space, they were let go in peace from the brethren unto the apostles.

34 Notwithstanding it pleased Sī-lās to abide there still.

35 Pāul also and Bār-nā-bās continued in Ān-tī-ōch, teaching and preaching the word of the Lord, with many others also.

36 ¶ And some days after Pāul said unto Bār-nā-bās, Let us go again and visit our brethren in every city where we have preached the word of the Lord, and see how they do.

37 And Bār-nā-bās determined to take with them Jōhn, whose surname was Mār̄k.

38 But Pāul thought not good to take him with them, who departed from them from Pām-phyl-ī-ā, and went not with them to the work.

39 And the contention was so sharp between them, that they departed asunder one from the other: and so Bār-nā-bās took Mār̄k, and sailed unto Ćy-prūs;

40 And Pāul chose Sī-lās, and departed, being recommended by the brethren unto the grace of God.

41 And he went through Sŷr-ī-ā and Ćī-līç-ī-ā, confirming the churches.

CHAPTER 16

THEN came he to Dēr-bē and Lŷs-trā: and, behold, a certain disciple was there, named Tī-mōth-ē-ūs, the son of a certain woman, which was a Jēw-ēss, and believed; but his father was a Grēek:

2 Which was well reported of by the brethren that were at Lŷs-trā and Ī-cō-nī-ūm.

3 Him would Pāul have to go forth with him; and took and circumcised him because of the Jēws which were in those quarters: for they knew all that his father was a Grēek.

4 And as they went through the cities, they delivered them the decrees for to keep, that were ordained of the apostles and elders which were at Jē-rū-sā-lēm.

5 And so were the churches established in the faith, and increased in number daily.

6 Now when they had gone throughout Phrŷg-ī-ā and the region of Gā-lā-tīā, and were forbidden of the Holy Ghost to preach the word in Ā-sīā,

7 After they were come to Mŷs-ī-ā, they assayed to go into Bī-thŷn-ī-ā: but the Spirit suffered them not.

8 And they passing by Mŷs-ī-ā came down to Trō-ās.

9 And a vision appeared to Pāul in the night; There stood a man of Māç-ē-dō-nī-ā, and prayed him, saying, Come over into Māç-ē-dō-nī-ā, and help us.

10 And after he had seen the vision, immediately we endeavoured to go into Māç-ē-dō-nī-ā, assuredly gathering that the Lord had called us for to preach the gospel unto them.

11 Therefore loosing from Trō-ās, we came with a straight course to Sām-ō-thrā-çī-ā, and the next day to Nē-ā-pō-līs;

12 And from thence to Phī-līp-pī, which is the chief city of that part of Māç-ē-dō-nī-ā, and a colony: and we were in that city abiding certain days.

13 And on the sabbath we went out of the city by a river

side, where prayer was wont to be made; and we sat down, and spake unto the women which resorted *thither*.

14 ¶ And a certain woman named Lŷd-ī-ā, a seller of purple, of the city of Thŷ-ā-tī-rā, which worshipped God, heard us: whose heart the Lord opened, that she attended unto the things which were spoken of Pāul.

15 And when she was baptized, and her household, she besought us, saying, If ye have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come into my house, and abide *there*. And she constrained us.

16 ¶ And it came to pass, as we went to prayer, a certain damsel possessed with a spirit of divination met us, which brought her masters much gain by soothsaying:

17 The same followed Pāul and us, and cried, saying, These men are the servants of the most high God, which shew unto us the way of salvation.

18 And this did she many days. But Pāul, being grieved, turned and said to the spirit, I command thee in the name of Jē-sūs Christ to come out of her. And he came out the same hour.

19 ¶ And when her masters saw that the hope of their gains was gone, they caught Pāul and Sī-lās, and drew *them* into the marketplace unto the rulers,

20 And brought them to the magistrates, saying, These men, being Jēws, do exceedingly trouble our city,

21 And teach customs, which are not lawful for us to receive, neither to observe, being Rō-māns.

22 And the multitude rose up together against them: and the magistrates rent off their clothes, and commanded to beat *them*.

23 And when they had laid many stripes upon them, they cast *them* into prison, charging the jailor to keep them safely:

24 Who, having received such a charge, thrust them into the inner prison, and made their feet fast in the stocks.

25 ¶ And at midnight Pāul and Sī-lās prayed, and sang praises unto God: and the prisoners heard them.

26 And suddenly there was a great earthquake, so that the foundations of the prison were shaken: and immediately all the doors were opened, and every one's bands were loosed.

27 And the keeper of the prison awaking out of his sleep, and seeing the prison doors open, he drew out his sword, and would have killed himself, supposing that the prisoners had been fled.

28 But Pāul cried with a loud voice, saying, Do thyself no harm: for we are all here.

29 Then he called for a light, and sprang in, and came trembling, and fell down before Pāul and Sī-lās,

30 And brought them out, and said, Sirs, what must I do to be saved?

31 And they said, Believe on the Lord Jē-sūs Christ, and thou shalt be saved, and thy house.

32 And they spake unto him the word of the Lord, and to all that were in his house.

33 And he took them the same hour of the night, and

washed *their* stripes; and was baptized, he and all his, straightway.

34 And when he had brought them into his house, he set meat before them, and rejoiced, believing in God with all his house.

35 And when it was day, the magistrates sent the serjeants, saying, Let those men go.

36 And the keeper of the prison told this saying to P^{au}l, The magistrates have sent to let you go: now therefore depart, and go in peace.

37 But P^{au}l said unto them, They have beaten us openly uncondemned, being Rō-māns, and have cast us into prison; and now do they thrust us out privily? nay verily; but let them come themselves and fetch us out.

38 And the serjeants told these words unto the magistrates: and they feared, when they heard that they were Rō-māns.

39 And they came and besought them, and brought *them* out, and desired *them* to depart out of the city.

40 And they went out of the prison, and entered into *the house of* Lŷd-ĭ-ă: and when they had seen the brethren, they comforted them, and departed.

CHAPTER 17

Now when they had passed through Ām-phĭp-ō-līs and Āp-ōl-lō-nĭ-ă, they came to Thēss-ă-lō-nĭ-că, where was a synagogue of the Jēw^s:

2 And P^{au}l, as his manner was, went in unto them, and three sabbath days reasoned with them out of the scriptures,

3 Opening and alleging, that Christ must needs have suffered, and risen again from the dead; and that this Jē-sūs, whom I preach unto you, is Christ.

4 And some of them believed, and consorted with P^{au}l and Sĭ-lās; and of the devout Greeks a great multitude, and of the chief women not a few.

5 ¶ But the Jēw^s which believed not, moved with envy, took unto them certain lewd fellows of the baser sort, and gathered a company, and set all the city on an uproar, and assaulted the house of Jā-son, and sought to bring them out to the people.

6 And when they found them not, they drew Jā-son and certain brethren unto the rulers of the city, crying, These that have turned the world upside down are come hither also;

7 Whom Jā-son hath received: and these all do contrary to the decrees of Çæ-šār, saying that there is another king, *one* Jē-sūs.

8 And they troubled the people and the rulers of the city, when they heard these things.

9 And when they had taken security of Jā-son, and of the other, they let them go.

10 ¶ And the brethren immediately sent away P^{au}l and Sĭ-lās by night unto Bē-rē-ă: who coming *thither* went into the synagogue of the Jēw^s.

11 These were more noble than those in Thēss-ă-lō-nĭ-că, in that they received the word with all readiness of mind,

and searched the scriptures daily, whether those things were so.

12 Therefore many of them believed; also of honourable women which were Grēeks, and of men, not a few.

13 But when the Jēw^s of Thēss-ă-lō-nĭ-că had knowledge that the word of God was preached of P^{au}l at Bē-rē-ă, they came thither also, and stirred up the people.

14 And then immediately the brethren sent away P^{au}l to go as it were to the sea: but Sĭ-lās and Tĭ-mōth-ē-ūs abode there still.

15 And they that conducted P^{au}l brought him unto Āth-ēns: and receiving a commandment unto Sĭ-lās and Tĭ-mōth-ē-ūs for to come to him with all speed, they departed.

16 ¶ Now while P^{au}l waited for them at Āth-ēns, his spirit was stirred in him, when he saw the city wholly given to idolatry.

17 Therefore disputed he in the synagogue with the Jēw^s, and with the devout persons, and in the market daily with them that met with him.

18 Then certain philosophers of the Ēp-ĭ-cū-rē-ăns, and of the Stō-ĭcks, encountered him. And some said, What will this babbler say? other some, He seemeth to be a setter forth of strange gods: because he preached unto them Jē-sūs, and the resurrection.

19 And they took him, and brought him unto Ār-ē-ōp-ă-gūs, saying, May we know what this new doctrine, whereof thou speakest, is?

20 For thou bringest certain strange things to our ears: we would know therefore what these things mean.

21 (For all the Ā-thē-nĭ-ăns and strangers which were there spent their time in nothing else, but either to tell, or to hear some new thing.)

22 ¶ Then P^{au}l stood in the midst of Mārs' hill, and said, Ye men of Āth-ēns, I perceive that in all things ye are too superstitious.

23 For as I passed by, and beheld your devotions, I found an altar with this inscription, TO THE UNKNOWN GOD. Whom therefore ye ignorantly worship, him declare I unto you.

24 God that made the world and all things therein, seeing that he is Lord of heaven and earth, dwelleth not in temples made with hands;

25 Neither is worshipped with men's hands, as though he needed any thing, seeing he giveth to all life, and breath, and all things;

26 And hath made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell on all the face of the earth, and hath determined the times before appointed, and the bounds of their habitation;

27 That they should seek the Lord, if haply they might feel after him, and find him, though he be not far from every one of us:

28 For in him we live, and move, and have our being; as certain also of your own poets have said, For we are also his offspring.

29 Forasmuch then as we are the offspring of God, we ought

not to think that the Godhead is like unto gold, or silver, or stone, graven by art and man's device.

30 And the times of this ignorance God winked at; but now commandeth all men every where to repent:

31 Because he hath appointed a day, in the which he will judge the world in righteousness by *that* man whom he hath ordained; *whereof* he hath given assurance unto all *men*, in that he hath raised him from the dead.

32 ¶ And when they heard of the resurrection of the dead, some mocked: and others said, We will hear thee again of this *matter*.

33 So Paul departed from among them.

34 Howbeit certain men clave unto him, and believed: among the which was Dī-ō-nŷs-ŷ-ūs the Ār-ē-ōp-ā-gīte, and a woman named Dām-ā-rīs, and others with them.

CHAPTER 18

AFTER these things Paul departed from Āth-ēns, and came to Cōr-īnth;

2 And found a certain Jēw named Ā-quīl-ā, born in Pōn-tūs, lately come from It-ā-lŷ, with his wife Prīs-čīl-lā; (because that Clau-dī-ūs had commanded all Jēws to depart from Rōme:) and came unto them.

3 And because he was of the same craft, he abode with them, and wrought: for by their occupation they were tentmakers.

4 And he reasoned in the synagogue every sabbath, and persuaded the Jēws and the Greeks.

5 And when Sī-lās and Tī-mōth-ē-ūs were come from Māç-ē-dō-nī-ā, Paul was pressed in the spirit, and testified to the Jēws *that* Jē-sūs was Christ.

6 And when they opposed themselves, and blasphemed, he shook *his* raiment, and said unto them, Your blood *be* upon your own heads; I *am* clean: from henceforth I will go unto the Ġēn-tīlēs.

7 ¶ And he departed thence, and entered into a certain *man's* house, named Jūs-tūs, *one* that worshipped God, whose house joined hard to the synagogue.

8 And Crīs-pūs, the chief ruler of the synagogue, believed on the Lord with all his house; and many of the Cō-rīn-thī-āns hearing believed, and were baptized.

9 Then spake the Lord to Paul in the night by a vision, Be not afraid, but speak, and hold not thy peace:

10 For I am with thee, and no man shall set on thee to hurt thee: for I have much people in this city.

11 And he continued *there* a year and six months, teaching the word of God among them.

12 ¶ And when Gāl-lī-ō was the deputy of Ā-chai-ā, the Jēws made insurrection with one accord against Paul, and brought him to the judgment seat,

13 Saying, This *fellow* persuadeth men to worship God contrary to the law.

14 And when Paul was now about to open *his* mouth, Gāl-lī-ō said unto the Jēws, If it were a matter of wrong or wicked lewdness, O ye Jēws, reason would that I should bear with you:

15 But if it be a question of words and names, and of your law, look ye to *it*; for I will be no judge of such *matters*.

16 And he drave them from the judgment seat.

17 Then all the Grēeks took Sōs-thē-nēs, the chief ruler of the synagogue, and beat *him* before the judgment seat. And Gāl-lī-ō cared for none of those things.

18 ¶ And Paul *after this* tarried *there* yet a good while, and then took his leave of the brethren, and sailed thence into Sŷr-ŷ-ā, and with him Prīs-čīl-lā and Ā-quīl-ā; having shorn *his* head in Čēn-chrē-ā: for he had a vow.

19 And he came to Ēph-ē-sūs, and left them there: but he himself entered into the synagogue, and reasoned with the Jēws.

20 When they desired *him* to tarry longer time with them, he consented not;

21 But bade them farewell, saying, I must by all means keep this feast that cometh in Jē-rû-sā-lēm: but I will return again unto you, if God will. And he sailed from Ēph-ē-sūs.

22 And when he had landed at Cā-šā-rē-ā, and gone up, and saluted the church, he went down to Ān-tī-ōch.

23 And after he had spent some time *there*, he departed, and went over *all* the country of Gā-lā-tīā and Phrŷg-ŷ-ā in order, strengthening all the disciples.

24 ¶ And a certain Jēw named Ā-pōl-lōs, born at Āl-ēx-ān-drī-ā, an eloquent man, and mighty in the scriptures, came to Ēph-ē-sūs.

25 This man was instructed in the way of the Lord; and being fervent in the spirit, he spake and taught diligently the things of the Lord, knowing only the baptism of Jōhn.

26 And he began to speak boldly in the synagogue: whom when Ā-quīl-ā and Prīs-čīl-lā had heard, they took him unto *them*, and expounded unto him the way of God more perfectly.

27 And when he was disposed to pass into Ā-chai-ā, the brethren wrote, exhorting the disciples to receive him: who, when he was come, helped them much which had believed through grace:

28 For he mightily convinced the Jēws, *and that* publicly, shewing by the scriptures that Jē-sūs was Christ.

CHAPTER 19

AND it came to pass, that, while Ā-pōl-lōs was at Cōr-īnth, Paul having passed through the upper coasts came to Ēph-ē-sūs: and finding certain disciples,

2 He said unto them, Have ye received the Holy Ghost since ye believed? And they said unto him, We have not so much as heard whether there be any Holy Ghost.

3 And he said unto them, Unto what then were ye baptized? And they said, Unto Jōhn's baptism.

4 Then said Paul, Jōhn verily baptized with the baptism of repentance, saying unto the people, that they should believe on him which should come after him, that is, on Christ Jē-sūs.

5 When they heard *this*, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jē-sūs.

6 And when Paul had laid *his* hands upon them, the Holy

Ghost came on them; and they spake with tongues, and prophesied.

7 And all the men were about twelve.

8 And he went into the synagogue, and spake boldly for the space of three months, disputing and persuading the things concerning the kingdom of God.

9 But when divers were hardened, and believed not, but spake evil of that way before the multitude, he departed from them, and separated the disciples, disputing daily in the school of one T̄y-răn-nūs.

10 And this continued by the space of two years; so that all they which dwelt in Ā-siā heard the word of the Lord Jē-sūs, both Jēwś and Grēeks.

11 And God wrought special miracles by the hands of Pāul: 12 So that from his body were brought unto the sick handkerchiefs or aprons, and the diseases departed from them, and the evil spirits went out of them.

13 ¶ Then certain of the vagabond Jēwś, exorcists, took upon them to call over them which had evil spirits the name of the Lord Jē-sūs, saying, We adjure you by Jē-sūs whom Pāul preacheth.

14 And there were seven sons of one Sçē-vă, a Jēw, and chief of the priests, which did so.

15 And the evil spirit answered and said, Jē-sūs I know, and Pāul I know; but who are ye?

16 And the man in whom the evil spirit was leaped on them, and overcame them, and prevailed against them, so that they fled out of that house naked and wounded.

17 And this was known to all the Jēwś and Grēeks also dwelling at Ēph-ē-sūs; and fear fell on them all, and the name of the Lord Jē-sūs was magnified.

18 And many that believed came, and confessed, and shewed their deeds.

19 Many of them also which used curious arts brought their books together, and burned them before all *men*: and they counted the price of them, and found *it* fifty thousand *pieces* of silver.

20 So mightily grew the word of God and prevailed.

21 ¶ After these things were ended, Pāul purposed in the spirit, when he had passed through Măç-ē-dō-nĩ-ă and Ā-chai-ă, to go to Jē-rû-să-lēm, saying, After I have been there, I must also see Rōme.

22 So he sent into Măç-ē-dō-nĩ-ă two of them that ministered unto him, Tī-mōth-ē-ūs and Ē-răs-tūs; but he himself stayed in Ā-siā for a season.

23 And the same time there arose no small stir about that way.

24 For a certain *man* named Dē-mē-trĩ-ūs, a silversmith, which made silver shrines for Dī-ăn-ă, brought no small gain unto the craftsmen;

25 Whom he called together with the workmen of like occupation, and said, Sirs, ye know that by this craft we have our wealth.

26 Moreover ye see and hear, that not alone at Ēph-ē-sūs, but almost throughout all Ā-siā, this Pāul hath persuaded

and turned away much people, saying that they be no gods, which are made with hands:

27 So that not only this our craft is in danger to be set at nought; but also that the temple of the great goddess Dī-ăn-ă should be despised, and her magnificence should be destroyed, whom all Ā-siā and the world worshippeth.

28 And when they heard *these sayings*, they were full of wrath, and cried out, saying, Great is Dī-ăn-ă of the Ēph-ē-siāns.

29 And the whole city was filled with confusion: and having caught Gai-ūs and Ār-is-tăr-chūs, men of Măç-ē-dō-nĩ-ă, Pāul's companions in travel, they rushed with one accord into the theatre.

30 And when Pāul would have entered in unto the people, the disciples suffered him not.

31 And certain of the chief of Ā-siā, which were his friends, sent unto him, desiring *him* that he would not adventure himself into the theatre.

32 Some therefore cried one thing, and some another: for the assembly was confused; and the more part knew not wherefore they were come together.

33 And they drew Āl-ēx-ăn-děr out of the multitude, the Jēwś putting him forward. And Āl-ēx-ăn-děr beckoned with the hand, and would have made his defence unto the people.

34 But when they knew that he was a Jēw, all with one voice about the space of two hours cried out, Great is Dī-ăn-ă of the Ēph-ē-siāns.

35 And when the townclerk had appeased the people, he said, Ye men of Ēph-ē-sūs, what man is there that knoweth not how that the city of the Ēph-ē-siāns is a worshipper of the great goddess Dī-ăn-ă, and of the *image* which fell down from Jû-pĩ-těr?

36 Seeing then that these things cannot be spoken against, ye ought to be quiet, and to do nothing rashly.

37 For ye have brought hither these men, which are neither robbers of churches, nor yet blasphemers of your goddess.

38 Wherefore if Dē-mē-trĩ-ūs, and the craftsmen which are with him, have a matter against any man, the law is open, and there are deputies: let them implead one another.

39 But if ye inquire any thing concerning other matters, it shall be determined in a lawful assembly.

40 For we are in danger to be called in question for this day's uproar, there being no cause whereby we may give an account of this concourse.

41 And when he had thus spoken, he dismissed the assembly.

CHAPTER 20

AND after the uproar was ceased, Pāul called unto *him* the disciples, and embraced *them*, and departed for to go into Măç-ē-dō-nĩ-ă.

2 And when he had gone over those parts, and had given them much exhortation, he came into Grēce,

3 And *there* abode three months. And when the Jēwś laid wait for him, as he was about to sail into Sŷr-ĩ-ă, he

purposed to return through Măc-ē-dō-nī-ă.

4 And there accompanied him into Ā-sīā Sō-pă-tēr of Bē-rē-ă; and of the Thēss-ă-lō-nī-āns, Ār-is-tār-chūs and Sē-cūn-dūs; and Gai-ūs of Dēr-bē, and Tī-mōth-ē-ūs; and of Ā-sīā, Tŷch-ī-cūs and Trōph-ī-mūs.

5 These goīng before tarried for us at Trō-ās.

6 And we sailed away from Phī-līp-pī after the days of unleavened bread, and came unto them to Trō-ās in five days; where we abode seven days.

7 And upon the first day of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread, Păul preached unto them, ready to depart on the morrow; and continued his speech until midnight.

8 And there were many lights in the upper chamber, where they were gathered together.

9 And there sat in a window a certain young man named Eū-tŷ-chūs, being fallen into a deep sleep: and as Păul was long preaching, he sunk down with sleep, and fell down from the third loft, and was taken up dead.

10 And Păul went down, and fell on him, and embracing him said, Trouble not yourselves; for his life is in him.

11 When he therefore was come up again, and had broken bread, and eaten, and talked a long while, even till break of day, so he departed.

12 And they brought the young man alive, and were not a little comforted.

13 ¶ And we went before to ship, and sailed unto Ās-sōs, there intending to take in Păul: for so had he appointed, minding himself to go afoot.

14 And when he met with us at Ās-sōs, we took him in, and came to Mīt-ŷ-lē-nē.

15 And we sailed thence, and came the next day over against Chī-ōs; and the next day we arrived at Sā-mōs, and tarried at Trō-gŷl-lī-ūm; and the next day we came to Mī-lē-tūs.

16 For Păul had determined to sail by Ēph-ē-sūs, because he would not spend the time in Ā-sīā: for he hasted, if it were possible for him, to be at Jē-rū-să-lēm the day of Pēn-tē-cōst.

17 ¶ And from Mī-lē-tūs he sent to Ēph-ē-sūs, and called the elders of the church.

18 And when they were come to him, he said unto them, Ye know, from the first day that I came into Ā-sīā, after what manner I have been with you at all seasons,

19 Serving the Lord with all humility of mind, and with many tears, and temptations, which befell me by the lying in wait of the Jēwś:

20 And how I kept back nothing that was profitable unto you, but have shewed you, and have taught you publickly, and from house to house,

21 Testifying both to the Jēwś, and also to the Grēeks, repentance toward God, and faith toward our Lord Jē-sūs Christ.

22 And now, behold, I go bound in the spirit unto Jē-rū-să-lēm, not knowing the things that shall befall me

there:

23 Save that the Holy Ghost witnesseth in every city, saying that bonds and afflictions abide me.

24 But none of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself, so that I might finish my course with joy, and the ministry, which I have received of the Lord Jē-sūs, to testify the gospel of the grace of God.

25 And now, behold, I know that ye all, among whom I have gone preaching the kingdom of God, shall see my face no more.

26 Wherefore I take you to record this day, that I *am* pure from the blood of all *men*.

27 For I have not shunned to declare unto you all the counsel of God.

28 ¶ Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over the which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers, to feed the church of God, which he hath purchased with his own blood.

29 For I know this, that after my departing shall grievous wolves enter in among you, not sparing the flock.

30 Also of your own selves shall men arise, speaking perverse things, to draw away disciples after them.

31 Therefore watch, and remember, that by the space of three years I ceased not to warn every one night and day with tears.

32 And now, brethren, I commend you to God, and to the word of his grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you an inheritance among all them which are sanctified.

33 I have coveted no man's silver, or gold, or apparel.

34 Yea, ye yourselves know, that these hands have ministered unto my necessities, and to them that were with me.

35 I have shewed you all things, how that so labouring ye ought to support the weak, and to remember the words of the Lord Jē-sūs, how he said, It is more blessed to give than to receive.

36 ¶ And when he had thus spoken, he kneeled down, and prayed with them all.

37 And they all wept sore, and fell on Păul's neck, and kissed him,

38 Sorrowing most of all for the words which he spake, that they should see his face no more. And they accompanied him unto the ship.

CHAPTER 21

AND it came to pass, that after we were gotten from them, and had launched, we came with a straight course unto Cō-ōs, and the day following unto Rhōdes, and from thence unto Păt-ă-ră:

2 And finding a ship sailing over unto Phē-nċ-ă, we went aboard, and set forth.

3 Now when we had discovered Çŷ-prūs, we left it on the left hand, and sailed into Sŷr-ī-ă, and landed at Tŷre: for there the ship was to unlade her burden.

4 And finding disciples, we tarried there seven days: who said to Paul through the Spirit, that he should not go up to

Jě-rû'-să-lēm.

5 And when we had accomplished those days, we departed and went our way; and they all brought us on our way, with wives and children, till we were out of the city: and we kneeled down on the shore, and prayed.

6 And when we had taken our leave one of another, we took ship; and they returned home again.

7 And when we had finished our course from Tÿre, we came to Ptōl-ē-mā-īs, and saluted the brethren, and abode with them one day.

8 And the next day we that were of Pāul's company departed, and came unto Cē-să-rē-ă: and we entered into the house of Phīl-īp the evangelist, which was one of the seven; and abode with him.

9 And the same man had four daughters, virgins, which did prophesy.

10 And as we tarried there many days, there came down from Jû-dē-ă a certain prophet, named Āg-ă-bŭs.

11 And when he was come unto us, he took Pāul's girdle, and bound his own hands and feet, and said, Thus saith the Holy Ghost, So shall the Jēw's at Jě-rû'-să-lēm bind the man that owneth this girdle, and shall deliver him into the hands of the Ġēn'-tīlēs.

12 And when we heard these things, both we, and they of that place, besought him not to go up to Jě-rû'-să-lēm.

13 Then Pāul answered, What mean ye to weep and to break mine heart? for I am ready not to be bound only, but also to die at Jě-rû'-să-lēm for the name of the Lord Jē-šŭs.

14 And when he would not be persuaded, we ceased, saying, The will of the Lord be done.

15 And after those days we took up our carriages, and went up to Jě-rû'-să-lēm.

16 There went with us also certain of the disciples of Cē-să-rē-ă, and brought with them one Mnā-son of Ćŷ-prŭs, an old disciple, with whom we should lodge.

17 And when we were come to Jě-rû'-să-lēm, the brethren received us gladly.

18 And the day following Pāul went in with us unto Jāmeš; and all the elders were present.

19 And when he had saluted them, he declared particularly what things God had wrought among the Ġēn'-tīlēs by his ministry.

20 And when they heard it, they glorified the Lord, and said unto him, Thou seest, brother, how many thousands of Jēw's there are which believe; and they are all zealous of the law:

21 And they are informed of thee, that thou teachest all the Jēw's which are among the Ġēn'-tīlēs to forsake Mō-šēs, saying that they ought not to circumcise their children, neither to walk after the customs.

22 What is it therefore? the multitude must needs come together: for they will hear that thou art come.

23 Do therefore this that we say to thee: We have four men which have a vow on them;

24 Them take, and purify thyself with them, and be at

charges with them, that they may shave their heads: and all may know that those things, whereof they were informed concerning thee, are nothing; but that thou thyself also walkest orderly, and keepest the law.

25 As touching the Ġēn'-tīlēs which believe, we have written and concluded that they observe no such thing, save only that they keep themselves from things offered to idols, and from blood, and from strangled, and from fornication.

26 Then Pāul took the men, and the next day purifying himself with them entered into the temple, to signify the accomplishment of the days of purification, until that an offering should be offered for every one of them.

27 And when the seven days were almost ended, the Jēw's which were of Ā-siā, when they saw him in the temple, stirred up all the people, and laid hands on him,

28 Crying out, Men of Īs-rā-ēl, help: This is the man, that teacheth all men every where against the people, and the law, and this place: and further brought Greeks also into the temple, and hath polluted this holy place.

29 (For they had seen before with him in the city Trōph-ī-mŭs an Ēph-ē-siān, whom they supposed that Pāul had brought into the temple.)

30 And all the city was moved, and the people ran together: and they took Pāul, and drew him out of the temple: and forthwith the doors were shut.

31 And as they went about to kill him, tidings came unto the chief captain of the band, that all Jě-rû'-să-lēm was in an uproar.

32 Who immediately took soldiers and centurions, and ran down unto them: and when they saw the chief captain and the soldiers, they left beating of Pāul.

33 Then the chief captain came near, and took him, and commanded him to be bound with two chains; and demanded who he was, and what he had done.

34 And some cried one thing, some another, among the multitude: and when he could not know the certainty for the tumult, he commanded him to be carried into the castle.

35 And when he came upon the stairs, so it was, that he was borne of the soldiers for the violence of the people.

36 For the multitude of the people followed after, crying, Away with him.

37 And as Pāul was to be led into the castle, he said unto the chief captain, May I speak unto thee? Who said, Canst thou speak Greek?

38 Art not thou that Ē-ğŷp-tiān, which before these days madest an uproar, and leddest out into the wilderness four thousand men that were murderers?

39 But Pāul said, I am a man which am a Jēw of Tār-sŭs, a city in Ći-līç-ī-ă, a citizen of no mean city: and, I beseech thee, suffer me to speak unto the people.

40 And when he had given him licence, Pāul stood on the stairs, and beckoned with the hand unto the people. And when there was made a great silence, he spake unto them in

the Hē-brēw tongue, saying,

CHAPTER 22

MEN, brethren, and fathers, hear ye my defence *which I make* now unto you.

2 (And when they heard that he spake in the Hē-brēw tongue to them, they kept the more silence: and he saith,)

3 I am verily a man *which am* a Jēw, born in Tār-sūs, a city in Ćī-līç-ĩ-ă, yet brought up in this city at the feet of Gă-mă-lī-ěl, and taught according to the perfect manner of the law of the fathers, and was zealous toward God, as ye all are this day.

4 And I persecuted this way unto the death, binding and delivering into prisons both men and women.

5 As also the high priest doth bear me witness, and all the estate of the elders: from whom also I received letters unto the brethren, and went to Dă-măs-cūs, to bring them which were there bound unto Jě-rû-să-lēm, for to be punished.

6 And it came to pass, that, as I made my journey, and was come nigh unto Dă-măs-cūs about noon, suddenly there shone from heaven a great light round about me.

7 And I fell unto the ground, and heard a voice saying unto me, Săul, Săul, why persecutest thou me?

8 And I answered, Who art thou, Lord? And he said unto me, I am Jě-sūs of Năz-ă-rěth, whom thou persecutest.

9 And they that were with me saw indeed the light, and were afraid; but they heard not the voice of him that spake to me.

10 And I said, What shall I do, Lord? And the Lord said unto me, Arise, and go into Dă-măs-cūs; and there it shall be told thee of all things which are appointed for thee to do.

11 And when I could not see for the glory of that light, being led by the hand of them that were with me, I came into Dă-măs-cūs.

12 And one Ăn-ă-nĩ-ăs, a devout man according to the law, having a good report of all the Jēws which dwelt *there*,

13 Came unto me, and stood, and said unto me, Brother Săul, receive thy sight. And the same hour I looked up upon him.

14 And he said, The God of our fathers hath chosen thee, that thou shouldest know his will, and see that Just One, and shouldest hear the voice of his mouth.

15 For thou shalt be his witness unto all men of what thou hast seen and heard.

16 And now why tarriest thou? arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord.

17 And it came to pass, that, when I was come again to Jě-rû-să-lēm, even while I prayed in the temple, I was in a trance;

18 And saw him saying unto me, Make haste, and get thee quickly out of Jě-rû-să-lēm: for they will not receive thy testimony concerning me.

19 And I said, Lord, they know that I imprisoned and beat in every synagogue them that believed on thee:

20 And when the blood of thy martyr Stě-phěn was shed, I also was standing by, and consenting unto his death, and

kept the raiment of them that slew him.

21 And he said unto me, Depart: for I will send thee far hence unto the Ĝěn-tiles.

22 And they gave him audience unto this word, and *then* lifted up their voices, and said, Away with such a *fellow* from the earth: for it is not fit that he should live.

23 And as they cried out, and cast off *their* clothes, and threw dust into the air,

24 The chief captain commanded him to be brought into the castle, and bade that he should be examined by scourging; that he might know wherefore they cried so against him.

25 And as they bound him with thongs, Păul said unto the centurion that stood by, Is it lawful for you to scourge a man that is a Rō-măn, and uncondemned?

26 When the centurion heard *that*, he went and told the chief captain, saying, Take heed what thou doest: for this man is a Rō-măn.

27 Then the chief captain came, and said unto him, Tell me, art thou a Rō-măn? He said, Yea.

28 And the chief captain answered, With a great sum obtained I this freedom. And Păul said, But I was *free* born.

29 Then straightway they departed from him which should have examined him: and the chief captain also was afraid, after he knew that he was a Rō-măn, and because he had bound him.

30 On the morrow, because he would have known the certainty wherefore he was accused of the Jēws, he loosed him from *his* bands, and commanded the chief priests and all their council to appear, and brought Păul down, and set him before them.

CHAPTER 23

AND Păul, earnestly beholding the council, said, Men *and* brethren, I have lived in all good conscience before God until this day.

2 And the high priest Ăn-ă-nĩ-ăs commanded them that stood by him to smite him on the mouth.

3 Then said Păul unto him, God shall smite thee, *thou* whited wall: for sittest thou to judge me after the law, and commandest me to be smitten contrary to the law?

4 And they that stood by said, Revilest thou God's high priest?

5 Then said Păul, I wist not, brethren, that he was the high priest: for it is written, Thou shalt not speak evil of the ruler of thy people.

6 But when Paul perceived that the one part were Săd-dū-çees, and the other Phăr-ĩ-sees, he cried out in the council, Men *and* brethren, I am a Phăr-ĩ-see, the son of a Phăr-ĩ-see: of the hope and resurrection of the dead I am called in question.

7 And when he had *so* said, there arose a dissension between the Phăr-ĩ-sees and the Săd-dū-çees: and the multitude was divided.

8 For the Săd-dū-çees say that there is *no* resurrection, neither angel, nor spirit: but the Phăr-ĩ-sees confess both.

9 And there arose a great cry: and the scribes *that were* of the Phǎr-î-seēs' part arose, and strove, saying, We find no evil in this man: but if a spirit or an angel hath spoken to him, let us not fight against God.

10 And when there arose a great dissension, the chief captain, fearing lest Paul should have been pulled in pieces of them, commanded the soldiers to go down, and to take him by force from among them, and to bring *him* into the castle.

11 And the night following the Lord stood by him, and said, Be of good cheer, Paul: for as thou hast testified of me in Jě-rû-sǎ-lēm, so must thou bear witness also at Rōme.

12 And when it was day, certain of the Jēw's banded together, and bound themselves under a curse, saying that they would neither eat nor drink till they had killed Paul.

13 And they were more than forty which had made this conspiracy.

14 And they came to the chief priests and elders, and said, We have bound ourselves under a great curse, that we will eat nothing until we have slain Paul.

15 Now therefore ye with the council signify to the chief captain that he bring him down unto you to morrow, as though ye would inquire something more perfectly concerning him: and we, or ever he come near, are ready to kill him.

16 And when Paul's sister's son heard of their lying in wait, he went and entered into the castle, and told Paul.

17 Then Paul called one of the centurions unto *him*, and said, Bring this young man unto the chief captain: for he hath a certain thing to tell him.

18 So he took him, and brought *him* to the chief captain, and said, Paul the prisoner called me unto *him*, and prayed me to bring this young man unto thee, who hath something to say unto thee.

19 Then the chief captain took him by the hand, and went *with him* aside privately, and asked *him*, What is that thou hast to tell me?

20 And he said, The Jēw's have agreed to desire thee that thou wouldest bring down Paul to morrow into the council, as though they would inquire somewhat of him more perfectly.

21 But do not thou yield unto them: for there lie in wait for him of them more than forty men, which have bound themselves with an oath, that they will neither eat nor drink till they have killed him: and now are they ready, looking for a promise from thee.

22 So the chief captain *then* let the young man depart, and charged *him*, See thou tell no man that thou hast shewed these things to me.

23 And he called unto *him* two centurions, saying, Make ready two hundred soldiers to go to Cǎ-sǎ-rē-ǎ, and horsemen threescore and ten, and spearmen two hundred, at the third hour of the night;

24 And provide *them* beasts, that they may set Paul on, and bring *him* safe unto Fē-līx the governor.

25 And he wrote a letter after this manner:

26 Clāu-dī-ūs Lys-î-ās unto the most excellent governor Fē-līx *sendeth* greeting.

27 This man was taken of the Jēw's, and should have been killed of them: then came I with an army, and rescued him, having understood that he was a Rō-mān.

28 And when I would have known the cause wherefore they accused him, I brought him forth into their council:

29 Whom I perceived to be accused of questions of their law, but to have nothing laid to his charge worthy of death or of bonds.

30 And when it was told me how that the Jēw's laid wait for the man, I sent straightway to thee, and gave commandment to his accusers also to say before thee what *they had* against him. Farewell.

31 Then the soldiers, as it was commanded them, took Paul, and brought *him* by night to Ān-tīp-ǎ-trīs.

32 On the morrow they left the horsemen to go with him, and returned to the castle:

33 Who, when they came to Cǎ-sǎ-rē-ǎ, and delivered the epistle to the governor, presented Paul also before him.

34 And when the governor had read *the letter*, he asked of what province he was. And when he understood that *he was* of Cī-līç-î-ǎ;

35 I will hear thee, said he, when thine accusers are also come. And he commanded him to be kept in Hēr-od's judgment hall.

CHAPTER 24

AND after five days Ān-ǎ-nī-ās the high priest descended with the elders, and *with* a certain orator *named* Těr-tūl-lūs, who informed the governor against Paul.

2 And when he was called forth, Těr-tūl-lūs began to accuse *him*, saying, Seeing that by thee we enjoy great quietness, and that very worthy deeds are done unto this nation by thy providence,

3 We accept *it* always, and in all places, most noble Fē-līx, with all thankfulness.

4 Notwithstanding, that I be not further tedious unto thee, I pray thee that thou wouldest hear us of thy clemency a few words.

5 For we have found this man a pestilent *fellow*, and a mover of sedition among all the Jēw's throughout the world, and a ringleader of the sect of the Nǎz-ǎ-rēneš:

6 Who also hath gone about to profane the temple: whom we took, and would have judged according to our law.

7 But the chief captain Lys-î-ās came *upon us*, and with great violence took *him* away out of our hands,

8 Commanding his accusers to come unto thee: by examining of whom thyself mayest take knowledge of all these things, whereof we accuse him.

9 And the Jēw's also assented, saying that these things were so.

10 Then Paul, after that the governor had beckoned unto him to speak, answered, Forasmuch as I know that thou

hast been of many years a judge unto this nation, I do the more cheerfully answer for myself:

11 Because that thou mayest understand, that there are yet but twelve days since I went up to Jě-rû-să-lēm for to worship.

12 And they neither found me in the temple disputing with any man, neither raising up the people, neither in the synagogues, nor in the city:

13 Neither can they prove the things whereof they now accuse me.

14 But this I confess unto thee, that after the way which they call heresy, so worship I the God of my fathers, believing all things which are written in the law and in the prophets:

15 And have hope toward God, which they themselves also allow, that there shall be a resurrection of the dead, both of the just and unjust.

16 And herein do I exercise myself, to have always a conscience void of offence toward God, and toward men.

17 Now after many years I came to bring alms to my nation, and offerings.

18 Whereupon certain Jēw's from Ā-siā found me purified in the temple, neither with multitude, nor with tumult.

19 Who ought to have been here before thee, and object, if they had ought against me.

20 Or else let these same *here* say, if they have found any evil doing in me, while I stood before the council,

21 Except it be for this one voice, that I cried standing among them, Touching the resurrection of the dead I am called in question by you this day.

22 And when Fē-līx heard these things, having more perfect knowledge of *that* way, he deferred them, and said, When Lys-ī-ās the chief captain shall come down, I will know the uttermost of your matter.

23 And he commanded a centurion to keep Pāul, and to let *him* have liberty, and that he should forbid none of his acquaintance to minister or come unto him.

24 And after certain days, when Fē-līx came with his wife Drū-sil-lā, which was a Jēw-ēss, he sent for Pāul, and heard him concerning the faith in Christ.

25 And as he reasoned of righteousness, temperance, and judgment to come, Fē-līx trembled, and answered, Go thy way for this time; when I have a convenient season, I will call for thee.

26 He hoped also that money should have been given him of Pāul, that he might loose him: wherefore he sent for him the oftener, and communed with him.

27 But after two years Pôr-çī-ūs Fēs-tūs came into Fē-līx' room: and Fē-līx, willing to shew the Jēw's a pleasure, left Pāul bound.

CHAPTER 25

NOW when Fēs-tūs was come into the province, after three days he ascended from Cē-să-rē-ă to Jě-rû-să-lēm.

2 Then the high priest and the chief of the Jēw's informed

him against Pāul, and besought him,

3 And desired favour against him, that he would send for him to Jě-rû-să-lēm, laying wait in the way to kill him.

4 But Fēs-tūs answered, that Pāul should be kept at Cē-să-rē-ă, and that he himself would depart shortly *thither*.

5 Let them therefore, said he, which among you are able, go down with *me*, and accuse this man, if there be any wickedness in him.

6 And when he had tarried among them more than ten days, he went down unto Cē-să-rē-ă; and the next day sitting on the judgment seat commanded Pāul to be brought.

7 And when he was come, the Jēw's which came down from Jě-rû-să-lēm stood round about, and laid many and grievous complaints against Pāul, which they could not prove.

8 While he answered for himself, Neither against the law of the Jēw's, neither against the temple, nor yet against Çæ-săr, have I offended any thing at all.

9 But Fēs-tūs, willing to do the Jēw's a pleasure, answered Pāul, and said, Wilt thou go up to Jě-rû-să-lēm, and there be judged of these things before me?

10 Then said Pāul, I stand at Çæ-săr's judgment seat, where I ought to be judged: to the Jēw's have I done no wrong, as thou very well knowest.

11 For if I be an offender, or have committed any thing worthy of death, I refuse not to die: but if there be none of these things whereof these accuse me, no man may deliver me unto them. I appeal unto Çæ-săr.

12 Then Fēs-tūs, when he had conferred with the council, answered, Hast thou appealed unto Çæ-săr? unto Çæ-săr shalt thou go.

13 And after certain days king Ā-grīp-pă and Bēr-nī-çē came unto Cē-să-rē-ă to salute Fēs-tūs.

14 And when they had been there many days, Fēs-tūs declared Pāul's cause unto the king, saying, There is a certain man left in bonds by Fē-līx:

15 About whom, when I was at Jě-rû-să-lēm, the chief priests and the elders of the Jēw's informed *me*, desiring to have judgment against him.

16 To whom I answered, It is not the manner of the Rō-măns to deliver any man to die, before that he which is accused have the accusers face to face, and have licence to answer for himself concerning the crime laid against him.

17 Therefore, when they were come hither, without any delay on the morrow I sat on the judgment seat, and commanded the man to be brought forth.

18 Against whom when the accusers stood up, they brought none accusation of such things as I supposed:

19 But had certain questions against him of their own superstition, and of one Jē-sūs, which was dead, whom Pāul affirmed to be alive.

20 And because I doubted of such manner of questions, I asked *him* whether he would go to Jě-rû-să-lēm, and there

be judged of these matters.

21 But when Pāul had appealed to be reserved unto the hearing of Āu-gūs-tūs, I commanded him to be kept till I might send him to Çæ-šār.

22 Then Ä-grīp-pā said unto Fēs-tūs, I would also hear the man myself. To morrow, said he, thou shalt hear him.

23 And on the morrow, when Ä-grīp-pā was come, and Bēr-nī-çē, with great pomp, and was entered into the place of hearing, with the chief captains, and principal men of the city, at Fēs-tūs' commandment Pāul was brought forth.

24 And Fēs-tūs said, King Ä-grīp-pā, and all men which are here present with us, ye see this man, about whom all the multitude of the Jēws have dealt with me, both at Jē-rû-sā-lēm, and *also* here, crying that he ought not to live any longer.

25 But when I found that he had committed nothing worthy of death, and that he himself hath appealed to Āu-gūs-tūs, I have determined to send him.

26 Of whom I have no certain thing to write unto my lord. Wherefore I have brought him forth before you, and specially before thee, O king Ä-grīp-pā, that, after examination had, I might have somewhat to write.

27 For it seemeth to me unreasonable to send a prisoner, and not withal to signify the crimes *laid* against him.

CHAPTER 26

THEN Ä-grīp-pā said unto Pāul, Thou art permitted to speak for thyself. Then Pāul stretched forth the hand, and answered for himself:

2 I think myself happy, king Ä-grīp-pā, because I shall answer for myself this day before thee touching all the things whereof I am accused of the Jēws:

3 Especially *because I know* thee to be expert in all customs and questions which are among the Jēws: wherefore I beseech thee to hear me patiently.

4 My manner of life from my youth, which was at the first among mine own nation at Jē-rû-sā-lēm, know all the Jēws;

5 Which knew me from the beginning, if they would testify, that after the most straitest sect of our religion I lived a Phār-ī-see.

6 And now I stand and am judged for the hope of the promise made of God unto our fathers:

7 Unto which *promise* our twelve tribes, instantly serving God day and night, hope to come. For which hope's sake, king Ä-grīp-pā, I am accused of the Jēws.

8 Why should it be thought a thing incredible with you, that God should raise the dead?

9 I verily thought with myself, that I ought to do many things contrary to the name of Jē-šūs of Nāz-ā-rēth.

10 Which thing I also did in Jē-rû-sā-lēm: and many of the saints did I shut up in prison, having received authority from the chief priests; and when they were put to death, I gave my voice against *them*.

11 And I punished them oft in every synagogue, and compelled *them* to blaspheme; and being exceedingly mad against them, I persecuted *them* even unto strange cities.

12 Whereupon as I went to Dă-măs-cūs with authority and commission from the chief priests,

13 At midday, O king, I saw in the way a light from heaven, above the brightness of the sun, shining round about me and them which journeyed with me.

14 And when we were all fallen to the earth, I heard a voice speaking unto me, and saying in the Hē-brēw tongue, Sāul, Sāul, why persecutest thou me? *it is hard* for thee to kick against the pricks.

15 And I said, Who art thou, Lord? And he said, I am Jē-šūs whom thou persecutest.

16 But rise, and stand upon thy feet: for I have appeared unto thee for this purpose, to make thee a minister and a witness both of these things which thou hast seen, and of those things in the which I will appear unto thee;

17 Delivering thee from the people, and *from* the Ġēn-tileš, unto whom now I send thee,

18 To open their eyes, *and* to turn *them* from darkness to light, and *from* the power of Sā-tān unto God, that they may receive forgiveness of sins, and inheritance among them which are sanctified by faith that is in me.

19 Whereupon, O king Ä-grīp-pā, I was not disobedient unto the heavenly vision:

20 But shewed first unto them of Dă-măs-cūs, and at Jē-rû-sā-lēm, and throughout all the coasts of Jû-dā-ā, and *then* to the Ġēn-tileš, that they should repent and turn to God, and do works meet for repentance.

21 For these causes the Jēws caught me in the temple, and went about to kill *me*.

22 Having therefore obtained help of God, I continue unto this day, witnessing both to small and great, saying none other things than those which the prophets and Mō-šēs did say should come:

23 That Christ should suffer, *and* that he should be the first that should rise from the dead, and should shew light unto the people, and to the Ġēn-tileš.

24 And as he thus spake for himself, Fēs-tūs said with a loud voice, Pāul, thou art beside thyself; much learning doth make thee mad.

25 But he said, I am not mad, most noble Fēs-tūs; but speak forth the words of truth and soberness.

26 For the king knoweth of these things, before whom also I speak freely: for I am persuaded that none of these things are hidden from him; for this thing was not done in a corner.

27 King Ä-grīp-pā, believest thou the prophets? I know that thou believest.

28 Then Ä-grīp-pā said unto Pāul, Almost thou persuadest me to be a Chrīs-tiān.

29 And Pāul said, I would to God, that not only thou, but also all that hear me this day, were both almost, and altogether such as I am, except these bonds.

30 And when he had thus spoken, the king rose up, and the governor, and Bēr-nī-çē, and they that sat with them:

31 And when they were gone aside, they talked between

themselves, saying, This man doeth nothing worthy of death or of bonds.

32 Then said Ā-grīp-pā unto Fēs-tūs, This man might have been set at liberty, if he had not appealed unto Çæ-śār.

CHAPTER 27

AND when it was determined that we should sail into Āīt-ā-lŷ, they delivered Pāul and certain other prisoners unto *one* named Jû-lī-ūs, a centurion of Āu-gūs-tūs' band.

2 And entering into a ship of Ād-rā-mŷt-tī-ūm, we launched, meaning to sail by the coasts of Ā-sīā; *one* Ār-is-tār-chūs, a Măc-ē-dō-nī-ăn of Thëss-ā-lō-nī-că, being with us.

3 And the next day we touched at Šī-dōn. And Jû-lī-ūs courteously entreated Pāul, and gave *him* liberty to go unto his friends to refresh himself.

4 And when we had launched from thence, we sailed under Çŷ-prūs, because the winds were contrary.

5 And when we had sailed over the sea of Çī-lŷ-ī-ă and Păm-phŷl-ī-ă, we came to Mŷ-ră, a city of Lŷç-ī-ă.

6 And there the centurion found a ship of Āl-ëx-ăn-drī-ă sailing into Īt-ā-lŷ; and he put us therein.

7 And when we had sailed slowly many days, and scarce were come over against Cnī-dūs, the wind not suffering us, we sailed under Crēte, over against Săl-mō-nē;

8 And, hardly passing it, came unto a place which is called The fair havens; nigh whereunto was the city of Lă-sē-ă.

9 Now when much time was spent, and when sailing was now dangerous, because the fast was now already past, Pāul admonished *them*,

10 And said unto them, Sirs, I perceive that this voyage will be with hurt and much damage, not only of the lading and ship, but also of our lives.

11 Nevertheless the centurion believed the master and the owner of the ship, more than those things which were spoken by Pāul.

12 And because the haven was not commodious to winter in, the more part advised to depart thence also, if by any means they might attain to Phē-nī-çē, and *there* to winter; *which is* an haven of Crēte, and lieth toward the south west and north west.

13 And when the south wind blew softly, supposing that they had obtained *their* purpose, loosing *thence*, they sailed close by Crēte.

14 But not long after there arose against it a tempestuous wind, called Eû-rōc-lŷ-dōn.

15 And when the ship was caught, and could not bear up into the wind, we let *her* drive.

16 And running under a certain island which is called Clău-dă, we had much work to come by the boat:

17 Which when they had taken up, they used helps, undergirding the ship; and, fearing lest they should fall into the quicksands, strake sail, and so were driven.

18 And we being exceedingly tossed with a tempest, the next day they lightened the ship;

19 And the third day we cast out with our own hands the tackling of the ship.

20 And when neither sun nor stars in many days appeared, and no small tempest lay on us, all hope that we should be saved was then taken away.

21 But after long abstinence Pāul stood forth in the midst of them, and said, Sirs, ye should have hearkened unto me, and not have loosed from Crēte, and to have gained this harm and loss.

22 And now I exhort you to be of good cheer: for there shall be no loss of *any man's* life among you, but of the ship.

23 For there stood by me this night the angel of God, whose I am, and whom I serve,

24 Saying, Fear not, Pāul; thou must be brought before Çæ-śār: and, lo, God hath given thee all them that sail with thee.

25 Wherefore, sir, be of good cheer: for I believe God, that it shall be even as it was told me.

26 Howbeit we must be cast upon a certain island.

27 But when the fourteenth night was come, as we were driven up and down in Ā-drī-ă, about midnight the shipmen deemed that they drew near to some country;

28 And sounded, and found *it* twenty fathoms: and when they had gone a little further, they sounded again, and found *it* fifteen fathoms.

29 Then fearing lest we should have fallen upon rocks, they cast four anchors out of the stern, and wished for the day.

30 And as the shipmen were about to flee out of the ship, when they had let down the boat into the sea, under colour as though they would have cast anchors out of the foreship,

31 Pāul said to the centurion and to the soldiers, Except these abide in the ship, ye cannot be saved.

32 Then the soldiers cut off the ropes of the boat, and let her fall off.

33 And while the day was coming on, Pāul besought *them* all to take meat, saying, This day is the fourteenth day that ye have tarried and continued fasting, having taken nothing.

34 Wherefore I pray you to take *some* meat: for this is for your health: for there shall not an hair fall from the head of any of you.

35 And when he had thus spoken, he took bread, and gave thanks to God in presence of them all: and when he had broken *it*, he began to eat.

36 Then were they all of good cheer, and they also took *some* meat.

37 And we were in all in the ship two hundred threescore and sixteen souls.

38 And when they had eaten enough, they lightened the ship, and cast out the wheat into the sea.

39 And when it was day, they knew not the land: but they discovered a certain creek with a shore, into the which they were minded, if it were possible, to thrust in the ship.

40 And when they had taken up the anchors, they committed *themselves* unto the sea, and loosed the rudder bands, and hoised up the mainsail to the wind, and made

toward shore.

41 And falling into a place where two seas met, they ran the ship aground; and the forepart stuck fast, and remained unmoveable, but the hinder part was broken with the violence of the waves.

42 And the soldiers' counsel was to kill the prisoners, lest any of them should swim out, and escape.

43 But the centurion, willing to save Paul, kept them from *their* purpose; and commanded that they which could swim should cast *themselves* first into the sea, and get to land:

44 And the rest, some on boards, and some on *broken pieces* of the ship. And so it came to pass, that they escaped all safe to land.

CHAPTER 28

AND when they were escaped, then they knew that the island was called Mēl'ī-tā.

2 And the barbarous people shewed us no little kindness: for they kindled a fire, and received us every one, because of the present rain, and because of the cold.

3 And when Paul had gathered a bundle of sticks, and laid *them* on the fire, there came a viper out of the heat, and fastened on his hand.

4 And when the barbarians saw the *venomous* beast hang on his hand, they said among themselves, No doubt this man is a murderer, whom, though he hath escaped the sea, yet vengeance suffereth not to live.

5 And he shook off the beast into the fire, and felt no harm.

6 Howbeit they looked when he should have swollen, or fallen down dead suddenly: but after they had looked a great while, and saw no harm come to him, they changed their minds, and said that he was a god.

7 In the same quarters were possessions of the chief man of the island, whose name was Pūb'li-ūs; who received us, and lodged us three days courteously.

8 And it came to pass, that the father of Pūb'li-ūs lay sick of a fever and of a bloody flux: to whom Paul entered in, and prayed, and laid his hands on him, and healed him.

9 So when this was done, others also, which had diseases in the island, came, and were healed:

10 Who also honoured us with many honours; and when we departed, they laded us with such things as were necessary.

11 And after three months we departed in a ship of Āl-ēx-ān-drī-ā, which had wintered in the isle, whose sign was Cās-tōr and Pōl-lūx.

12 And landing at Sŷr-ā-cūse, we tarried *there* three days.

13 And from thence we fetched a compass, and came to Rhē-ġi-ūm: and after one day the south wind blew, and we came the next day to Pū-tē-ō-lī:

14 Where we found brethren, and were desired to tarry with them seven days: and so we went toward Rōme.

15 And from thence, when the brethren heard of us, they came to meet us as far as Āp-pī-ī fōr-ūm, and The three

taverns: whom when Paul saw, he thanked God, and took courage.

16 And when we came to Rōme, the centurion delivered the prisoners to the captain of the guard: but Paul was suffered to dwell by himself with a soldier that kept him.

17 And it came to pass, that after three days Paul called the chief of the Jēw's together: and when they were come together, he said unto them, Men *and* brethren, though I have committed nothing against the people, or customs of our fathers, yet was I delivered prisoner from Jē-rū-sā-lēm into the hands of the Rō-māns.

18 Who, when they had examined me, would have let *me* go, because there was no cause of death in me.

19 But when the Jēw's spake against *it*, I was constrained to appeal unto Çæ-sār; not that I had ought to accuse my nation of.

20 For this cause therefore have I called for you, to see *you*, and to speak with *you*: because that for the hope of Īs-rā-ēl I am bound with this chain.

21 And they said unto him, We neither received letters out of Jû-dā-ā concerning thee, neither any of the brethren that came shewed or spake any harm of thee.

22 But we desire to hear of thee what thou thinkest: for as concerning this sect, we know that every where it is spoken against.

23 And when they had appointed him a day, there came many to him into *his* lodging; to whom he expounded and testified the kingdom of God, persuading them concerning Jē-sūs, both out of the law of Mō-sēs, and out of the prophets, from morning till evening.

24 And some believed the things which were spoken, and some believed not.

25 And when they agreed not among themselves, they departed, after that Paul had spoken one word, Well spake the Holy Ghost by Ē-sai-ās the prophet unto our fathers,

26 Saying, Go unto this people, and say, Hearing ye shall hear, and shall not understand; and seeing ye shall see, and not perceive:

27 For the heart of this people is waxed gross, and their ears are dull of hearing, and their eyes have they closed; lest they should see with *their* eyes, and hear with *their* ears, and understand with *their* heart, and should be converted, and I should heal them.

28 Be it known therefore unto you, that the salvation of God is sent unto the Ġēn-tiles, and *that* they will hear it.

29 And when he had said these words, the Jēw's departed, and had great reasoning among themselves.

30 And Paul dwelt two whole years in his own hired house, and received all that came in unto him,

31 Preaching the kingdom of God, and teaching those things which concern the Lord Jē-sūs Chrīst, with all confidence, no man forbidding him.
